## Colgate University / Max A. Shacknai COVE

Civic Action Plan - 2024

### **Background/Executive Summary:**

Since 2014, Colgate University has participated in the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE) run through Tufts University, which provides information on voter engagement in comparison with hundreds of other colleges and universities across the United States. When Associate Professor of History Heather Roller learned that student voter turnout for the 2014 midterms was only at 7%, and that 2016 turnout of 48% was also behind the national average of 50%, she knew Colgate could do better. She and other faculty, staff, and students formed The Colgate Vote Project (CVP) in 2018 as a nonpartisan initiative seeking to increase student voter turnout. In the Fall 2018 semester, Professor Roller and 40 faculty and staff worked to help provide feedback and support for student leadership at the time. With financial support from the Office of the President, Ellie Schonberg '21 and Sarah Shahidi '21 led the project throughout the fall semester, eventually growing the CVP to 200 student members and earning permanent club status, funding, and advising support with the Max A. Shacknai Center for Outreach, Volunteerism and Education (COVE).

Since then, the Colgate Vote Project has expanded its initial plans and increased engagement through student-oriented educational events, campus-wide voting promotion, and online and social media campaigns. The CVP aims to standardize the voting process by utilizing Vote.org as an online tool that allows students to register to vote, apply for their absentee ballot, identify their local polling place, and search for state-county-specific voting information. Additionally, CVP has collaborated with leadership within the COVE to host guest speaker events and panel discussions with faculty, staff, and students on current political or electoral topics.

In 2018, Colgate had a dramatic improvement in student voter turnout in the midterm elections, up to 32% from 7% in 2014, according to NSLVE. This tracks with national data on the 18-29-year-old voting cohort, and is certainly something we hope to sustain and build upon, although the 2018 midterms were historic (the largest % for voter turnout for any midterm election in almost a century).

The COVE and the Colgate Vote Project received outstanding news following the 2020 Presidential election, as well. Voter turnout increased by 22.4% from 2016 to 2020, from 48.8% to 70.8%. While this trend is certainly in line with the national increase in voter turnout, Coglate's rate was nearly 5 points higher than the national average of 66% of eligible voting students. We are exceptionally pleased with these numbers and inspired to continue this important work.

Prior to the 2020 Presidential election, the Colgate Vote Project held a National Voter Registration Drive, hosted an online "Pledge to Vote" Campaign with whom 350 students interacted, provided rides to the polls, partnered with Colgate Athletics to reach 100% student-athlete voter

registration and join efforts with multiple other student organizations to increase voter awareness and education. In 2021, CVP visited 17 First-Year seminars, reaching over 250 students, to directly engage with First-Year students. We also hosted two different education events, a Brown Bag with the Former Mayor of Syracuse Stephanie Miner on local elections/politics, and a panel discussion with Political Science Professors Rosenfeld and Koter, and Director of the COVE Jeremy Wattles on gerrymandering and redistricting.

Additionally, in the Fall of 2021, Democracy Matters joined the COVE as another non-partisan volunteer organization on campus. Democracy Matters began in 2001 when Adonal Foyle, a Colgate alumni and former NBA basketball player, along with his parents Joan and Jay Mandle, dedicated themselves to voter education and reducing the influence of money in elections. Foyle and his family still travel around the world to universities to promote the importance of democracy and being an engaged citizen in society. Democracy Matters works alongside CVP to host voter registration and education events, hold Brown Bags surrounding important political and historical issues (such as the role of women throughout history in elections), and hold meetings where club members discuss the importance of social activism. Today Owen Fahey '25, Logan Wilson '26 and Maeve Reiter '26 lead Democracy Matters, who work alongside CVP leaders Lauren Levin '26, Ciara Anselm '26, Gwen Field '26 and Sarah van Dyke '25.

In the fall of 2022, the COVE created an intern position specifically for Civic Engagement, to work alongside the student leadership team of CVP and Democracy Matters. The COVE hires an additional intern during national election cycles to supplement voter engagement efforts. Usually, students in this role have connections to either the Colgate Vote Project or Democracy Matters and will work 8-10 hours a week. Their role during the election semesters is to directly assist CVP and Democracy Matters with national voter registration day, voter registration events, and coordinate an Election Night Party for students. During off years when there are no national elections, one intern continues to work with the COVE to institutionalize civic engagement across campus. In this upcoming election year, we will employ two interns. Typical intern duties include: Writing a bi-weekly newsletter, assisting the two clubs, and collaborating with other campus organizations on Civic Engagement efforts, among other realated duties.

Student leaders from CVP, Democracy Matters, the Civic Engagement Intern, and COVE Director Jeremy Wattles collaborated on the creation of our action plans for 2023 and 2024 (see below). Through these plans, we hope to further institutionalize voter engagement at Colgate University, and increase voter turnout from 70.8% in 2020 to 75% in 2024. Finally, we hope to create a community amongst all politically active groups on campus, increasing voter education and political engagement across all facets of University life for the long term.

<u>Fall 2024</u>: Intend to have Owen Fahey, Logan Wilson, Georgette Manos, Sarah van Dyke and a combination of student leaders from the Democrats, Socialists, Republicans, and Planned Parenthood on a steering committee dedicated to the non-partisan goal of increasing voter turnout on campus.
