

College of DuPage COD Votes Democratic Engagement Action Plan: 2022-2024

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Executive Summary

This action plan was developed by Stephanie Quirk, Coordinator of Student Life in partnership with students in the Student Leadership Council and members of the COD Votes team to communicate our strategy for increasing both the registration and turnout rates of voters at College of DuPage. The planned activities outlined here will be carried out over 2022-2024 Academic year, on and around our campus in Glen Ellyn, Illinois.

The following groups will be leading this work at College of DuPage to accomplish our goals and further institutionalize our commitment to civic learning, democratic engagement, and youth participation in elections:

- Undergraduate Students
- Faculty from a variety of disciplines
- Student Affairs Staff and Managers

The mission of our initiative is:

• The COD Votes team is a cross-institutional group of College of DuPage students, staff, faculty, and community members working to increase nonpartisan civic learning and engagement in the democratic process.

The All In Campus Democracy Challenge action plan is a summary of the collaborative effort to unify and coordinate civic engagement activities at the College of DuPage. Our institution has a long history of serving students and the surrounding community with a focus on being a center for excellence in teaching, learning, and cultural experiences. It does this by championing the values of integrity, honesty, respect, responsibility, and equity. This action plan continues our ongoing commitment to make plans and to take action to increase nonpartisan student civic learning, political engagement, and – especially – voter participation.

Here we formalize our commitment to:

- Establish a team dedicated to increasing nonpartisan civic learning and engagement in the democratic process
- Ensure College of DuPage has an annual plan with short and long-term goals for increasing voting rates among the student body.
- Provide ongoing opportunities for College of DuPage students who wish to fulfill servicelearning requirements through the civic engagement of their peers

At the heart of this action plan is the goal of educating, empowering, and supporting students, faculty, staff, and community to become active participants, seek to appreciate and understand other perspectives, and make conscious decisions to have a positive impact on their communities.

This coalition is diverse and inclusive of representation from different parts of campus, including student leadership, different perspectives and areas of expertise, trusted leaders and organizations who support communities that are historically underrepresented in democracy, and leaders who can help with outreach and power building by bringing more people across campus into our work. We also have established a relationship with the DuPage County Elections Division and have the support of the Deputy Clerk to continue developing opportunities to enhance civic engagement and learning on campus.

To ensure continuity of leadership, Stephanie Quirk's job description was updated in 2023 from "Coordinator of Student Life, Leadership" to "Coordinator of Student Life, Leadership and Civic Engagement". The Office of Student Life also created a "COD Votes Student Assistant" position with primary responsibilities to support the Student Leadership Council COD Votes student committee and COD Votes advisory committee work. The Student Leadership Council continues to commit to appointing one student officer position and one student representative position to lead the COD Votes student committee work which is renewed annually. The Student Leadership Council's COD Votes student committee meets weekly. Our COD Votes advisory team meets quarterly for all-team meetings at the College of DuPage and faculty and staff convene monthly for working meetings as a civic engagement community of practice. We also partner with the following organizations from the Students Learn Students Vote Coalition to support our efforts on campus: All In Campus Democracy Challenge, National Voter Registration Day, and Democracy Works: Turbo Vote and we are active members of the Community College Campus Compact group.

Commitment

College of DuPage's institutional philosophy is clear: we are wholly committed to facilitating and supporting student success in learning and we affirm our role as a catalyst for promoting dialogue and tolerance on issues supporting the common good. An institutional-level commitment to civic engagement sends a message to all students and the campus community that Chaps live out the core values of integrity, honesty, respect, responsibility, and equity when they are civically engaged and vote. Dr. Brian Caputo, the President of College of DuPage, has signed the Presidential Commitment of the All In Challenge, showing his dedication to promoting civic learning and democratic engagement on our campus.

We are continually seeking additional opportunities to increase the emphasis on civic learning and democratic engagement on campus.

Landscape

The Student Leadership Council and Office of Student Life have a long history of encouraging students to become civically engaged. The Three Tenets of Leadership Philosophy, developed in the Office of Student Life in 1991 speaks directly to this effort to align our definition of leadership with a positive impact in the community. The three tenets are:

- Active participation in life and communities
- Appreciation and understanding of multiple perspectives
- Conscious decision-making

Practicing these three tenets to have a positive impact in the community is leadership and is how civic engagement is centered in the work of Student Life and the Student Leadership Council.

In addition to these efforts, several other areas of the college facilitate programming, host cocurricular activities, and teach faculty courses with learning outcomes aligned with enhancing students' civic literacy and encouraging civic and political engagement. Although great work is being done across campus, there is room for improvement and this plan can serve as our commitment as we look to expand on-campus programs and partnerships with the community.

The following tables provide a brief overview of the landscape of our campus. This information is based on data collected from Fall 2023 when our total student enrollment was 23,216.

Our institution also gathers data through the Community College Survey of Student Engagement, however, we do not currently use this data for action planning related to COD Votes. This is a future opportunity for our team.

Goals

Before setting our civic learning and democratic engagement goals on campus, we considered the following information. We know our campus faces the following challenges internally when it comes to get out the vote efforts and registering voters:

- Our institution's mission statement, values, and strategic plan do not specifically mention civic learning and democratic engagement.
- We don't currently have processes for registering large percentages of our students.
- Our organization's respective webpage does not contain a streamlined and structured layout to display the following:
 - Voter Statistics
 - Encouragement for students to register to vote
 - Available opportunities for civic learning and engagement

With that said, we know our campus has the following strengths when we approach our voter engagement work:

- We have a coalition of people who are positioned to implement civic learning and democratic engagement on our campus.
- We hold routine convenes to discuss strategies for student outreach and involvement.
- We have ways in which we communicate voting information to our student body.
- We ensure consistent annual provision of programming on our campus to encourage civic engagement and voter registration efforts.
- We use the resources readily available to develop and implement civic learning and democratic engagement on our campus.
- We continue to host a variety of nonpartisan voter engagement efforts to garner involvement.
- We are able to engage student leaders for leadership opportunities and for the fulfillment of our initiative.
- We have working relationships with community partners who are invested in civic responsibilities and democratic engagement.
- We collaborate with nonpartisan organizations to fulfill mutual goals of raising awareness regarding civic duty.

Year 1 Goals

With this in mind, we have set the three goals that we would like to achieve over the next academic year (2023-2024):

- 1. Ensure that 75% of all incoming students enrolled in the First Year Experience course are registered to vote if eligible.
- 2. Increase our overall 2022 registration rate from 5% to 72%
- 3. Increase our overall 2022 voting rate from 5% to 44%

Year 5 Goals

We have also set five goals that we would like to achieve over the next five years (2024-2027):

- 1. Integrate voter registration and education into the First Year Experience course curriculum by fall 2024
 - a. Connect with First Year Experience faculty members to verify student voter registration and track registration rates.
 - b. Introduce surveys to collect feedback on students' experience related to civic engagement within the First Year Experience.
- 2. Develop a Poll Worker Project on campus in partnership with our local elections division and recruit 50 student participants
- 3. Achieve voter parity across racial and ethnic groups, with students of color voting at the same rate as white students.
 - a. 2020 data indicate White students are voting at a 64% rate and there is a gap of 22% for Asian students, 8% for Hispanic students, and 6% for Black students.
- 4. Increase our overall registration rate from 15% to 88%
- 5. Increase our overall voting rate from 15% to 73%

Short-Term Tactics

These are tactics that we plan to initiate in the short term (in the next year):

- Creation of a COD Votes brand identity
- Creation of social media campaigns each semester leading up to the 2024 election
- Spring / Fall Voter Registration Drives
- Additional Voter Education Events working with programming partners

These are tactics that we hope to accomplish in the short term (in the next year):

• Apply for funding to have an AmeriCorps VISTA to support civic engagement work on our campus.

Long-Term Tactics

These are tactics that we are already enacting for the long term (beyond the next year):

- Establish a Community of Practice (CoP) through Academic Affairs to craft a broader approach to civic engagement on campus.
- Hired a paid Student Fellow to support the ongoing coordination of campus volunteers.
- Conducting classroom presentation visits to educate and increase civic engagement.

These are tactics that we hope to bring about in the long term:


• Propose a Center for Civic Engagement at our institution.

National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE)

Our campus has access to our National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE) data for the 2020 presidential election. In 2020 our registration rate was 73.4%. In comparison to the data from four years prior in our NSLVE report, this rate increased.

In 2020, our voting rate was 58.7% and our voting rate among registered students was 80.1%. During this year, our voting rate was lower than the national average.

Our campus also has access to our NSLVE data for the 2018 midterm election. In 2018 our registration rate was 67.4%, our voting rate was 39.8% and our voting rate among registered students was 59%.



Since the 2016 presidential election, the most significant gains in voting rate were in our 18-29 age groups. The 18-21 age group increased their voting rate by 12%, the 22-24 age group increased by 10%, and the 25-29 increased by 10%.



- Seeking out feedback throughout the action planning process from people outside of our action planning team
- Revisiting our goals, identifying goals achieved and not achieved, and adjusting our short and long-term goals accordingly.
