Executive Summary:

This nonpartisan democratic engagement action plan was developed by Colorado Mesa University in Colorado for the 2024 election. The purpose of this action plan is to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter registration, education, and turnout in the 2024 election. The goals for Colorado Mesa University for the 2024 election are:

- Help register CMU students to vote in the election
- Inform students about how to vote in Mesa County and in their home districts where they might be registered
- Help inform the students of CMU and the larger public about the issues and candidates on the ballot
- Develop civic engagement and effective civic discourse on campus and in the broader community
- Partner with campus and community organizations to achieve these goals

Commitment:

This is the first action plan that Colorado Mesa University has developed for ALL IN.

We have scheduled at least one voter engagement activity each week from the start of the semester in August until the election in November and in the weeks after the election as well ending on the week of Thanksgiving. Many weeks have more than one event offered. (See the strategy section for a complete list of events and partners. These events are designed to build civic discourse on campus, to engage the local community in efforts to enhance voter participation and democratic practice including voter information campaigns, capacity building and civic dialogue.

Landscape:

Colorado Mesa University is a public, 4-year institution and joined the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge in 2024.

Our campus demographic and voting data:

Colorado Mesa University has 9,180 students. 45.4% of students come from the 14-county area CMU is statutorily designated to serve on the western slope of Colorado. 84.8% of students come from Colorado, 14.4% come from out of state and .8% are international students. 43.8% of students are the first in their family to attend college. 97.2% of students are under 25 years of age. 96.8% of students are undergraduate degree seeking students. 65.4% of students identified as white (non-Hispanic), 20.8% identified as Hispanic (of any race). 53.1% of the students identify as female.

The election is November 5th: Presidential, Congressional, Colorado state House and Senate seats, local government seats, and several local and statewide ballot issues are on the ballot. In Colorado voters can register to vote up to the day of the election. Organized voter registration campaigns must end 22 days before the election according to the CO Secretary of State's website.

Goals:

Our institution's nonpartisan democratic engagement goals are:

Goal 1: To successfully implement the strategy below with all events

Goal 2: To achieve all goals listed above in the executive summary

Goal 3: To participate in larger efforts at voter engagement including joining All-in efforts

Strategy:

Colorado Mesa University will implement these strategies to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter participation.

Weekly Events starting August 26th and continuing through the election:

Tabling Tuesdays – Any political organization (Democrats, Republicans, Libertarians, Forwardist Party, and even non-profits are allowed to table in the University Center for free to engage the students).

Voter Registration efforts – Most Tuesdays starting in the first week in September student organizations (POLS Club, Alpha Chi and CIC) will partner with the League of Women Voters or Mesa County Clerk and Recorder's office to set up voter registration and information tables in the University Center until late October when formal registration campaigns must end by CO state law. Additional Voter Registration booths will be set up at two Home Football games (at the tailgate activities before the game) on September 28th for Parent's Weekend and October18th for Homecoming. Mesa County Clerk and Recorder's Office was on campus for 5 hours to register and inform voters about the process for National Voter Registration Day on 9/17. A similar event with the Montrose Country Clerk and Recorder's office took place at our Montrose Campus.

- TBD Post election panel discussion on accepting loss in elections and mental health support for those depressed by the results of the election – Co-hosted with NAMI (student mental health club on campus)

Evaluation:

We will evaluate our action plan in the following ways:

Tracking student and community participation in various events by number.

Debrief events as a committee and survey students after the election about what events and efforts they participated in and how effective they were.

Reporting:
