

Community College of Rhode Island 2024 Nonpartisan Democratic Engagement Action Plan

Executive Summary

This nonpartisan democratic engagement action plan was developed by the Community College of Rhode Island (CCRI) for the 2024 election.

CCRI serves over 15, 000 students across the state of Rhode Island, with four physical campus locations; Warwick, Lincoln, Providence, and Newport.

The purpose of this action plan is to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement by increasing; student voter registration, education for democratic engagement, and physical turnout in the 2024 election.

Our primary goal for the next several months is to establish a campus coalition focused on increasing CCRI students' civic engagement through outreach and education. This will require relationship building, idea generation and implementation, and resource sharing.

The coalition will focus on specific goals of better understanding our voter data, adding voter registration to New Student Orientation, and increasing communications about important voting dates and information.

Our Commitment

Landscape

CCRI is a public community college. We are a Hispanic Serving Institution, serving the State of Rhode Island. As a commuter campus, our in-person students come from the surrounding Rhode Island towns.

- Full-time: 5,072 (41%); Part-time: 7,446 (59%)
- Gender: 60% female, 35% male, 5% unspecified
- Race/ethnicity: 3% Asian, 11% Black or African American, 28% Hispanic or Latinx, 6% Other/Unknown, 6% Two or more races, and 46% White

Goals:

Our institution's nonpartisan democratic engagement goals for this year are:

- Establish a campus civic engagement coalition, with representation from faculty, staff, students, and college leadership.
 - Meet regularly to plan civic engagement programming (as outlined in strategy section below) and to assess effectiveness.
- Have our president sign the <u>ALL IN Higher Education Presidents' Commitment to Full</u> Student Voter Participation.

Strategy

The Community College of Rhode Island will implement the strategies above to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter participation.

Important Dates

- Mid/Late September 2024 National Voter Registration Day Event: The college will
 partner with local voting organizations to host a voter registration drive. This event will
 have opportunities to register and provide important information on voting at the local,
 state, and national levels. We will have food and giveaways.
- October 7 11: National Voter Education Week: During this week, the college will host a Voter Education Event which will include: a voter registration drive, information regarding getting to know what will be on the ballot and where to find this information depending on where the student is registered to vote and information on planning to vote and understand the entirety of the voting process including early voting.
- Late October Early Voting Celebration: To celebrate Vote Early Day, CCRI will host an event guiding our community toward early voting processes and where to find the accurate information to cast their ballot early. The event will also outline the benefits to voting early and how to support friends and family with their voting plans. There will be snacks and giveaways for attendees.
- November 5: Election Day we will table on this date to remind students to vote and provide food and giveaways. We'll guide community members, including students, to polling sites along nearby bus routes since our campuses are situated on RITPA bus routes.

In addition to the specific events listed above, we will create a website within the CCRI website devoted to civic engagement. This site will provide links to voter registration sites, voting info for residents of RI, and important dates. This is where we will share our NSLVE data, info about our campus coalition, and other opportunities to be engaged.

We also hope to develop programming that supports students and CCRI community members to have facilitated discussions about politics and current issues in thoughtful and respectful ways. It is our goal to keep building upon this plan so that we can have a strong campaign for voter registration each academic year.

Evaluation

We are looking to re-enroll in the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement and have this data be used as a metric for voter registration statistics and comparison. CCRI will evaluate the increase of student voting by comparing our campus voter turnout and voter registration rates to past elections to measure progress on increasing both.

We will also track attendance at events and programming.
