This action plan is designed to increase civic learning and democratic engagement by encouraging all Roadrunners to become:

- ★ aware of personal identities and how they influence civic values, assumptions, and responsibilities.
- * engaged in civic opportunities on and off of campus.
- ★ educated on social and civil issues.

POLITICALLY ENGAGED

- ★ educated on the local, state, and national political process.
- ★ aware of local legislators and politicians.
- * active in the local, state, and national political process.

DEMOCRATICALLY ENGAGED

- ★ active and registered voters.
- ★ better educated on the importance of voting.
- * knowledgeable on where and how to vote.
- ★ actual voters for local, state, and federal elections.

Through participation in these three areas and collaborative efforts with academic affairs, this action plan will be able to help students connect and extend knowledge (facts, theories, etc.) from their academic study/field/discipline to civic engagement and to one's own participation in civic life, politics, and government.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP COALITION:

The coalition is staffed by SAVE Leaders (Students Advocating for Volunteer Efforts) who are committed to enhancing campus life by developing and executing programs and initiatives designed to advance campus and community engagement, provide civic-based learning opportunities, and create opportunities for powerful partnerships that foster positive social change.

There are four committees focused on the various components of community engagement and civic-based learning opportunities:

- Active Citizenship
- Alternative Breaks
- Civic Learning and Democratic Engagement
- Community Engagement and Volunteer Relations

Each of these committees and their objectives are outlined on the following slides.

All committees are advised by the Assistant Director for Leadership and Civic Engagement, Heather Williams.

These individuals will be responsible for implementing and evaluating the action plan in its inaugural year.



SAVE Leader applications are open to all currently enrolled DSC students meeting minimum requirements for the position. All applicants are required to participate in the interview process before selections were made. Final selections of membership will occur each August.



Active Citizenship Committee

The Active Citizenship committee strives to raise awareness and educate fellow Roadrunners on social issues and the impact they have on communities through awareness campaigns, experiential learning, and immersion experiences that require students to reflect on how that knowledge and those experiences inform values and life choices.

Responsibilities of this committee include oversight of Social Issue Awareness programs including, but not limited to:

- Hunger & Homelessness Week
- Sustainability Awareness Campaign
- Other Social Issues Programs i.e. Immigration, Education, Environment, etc.

These learning experiences provide students with foundational knowledge on important social issues often helping students identify a preference or opinion regarding the proper government response. When students are knowledgeable on social issues, knowledgeable on candidates' positions, and able to cast their vote based on these three considerations it helps them to become a more engaged and educated voter.





GOALSFOR CIVIC LEARNING & DEMOCRATIC ENGAGEMENT

GOALS: SHORT TERM

- 1. Apply to the NASPA Lead Initiative on Civic Learning and Democratic Engagement by June 30, 2018. Institutions selected to participate in this initiative will work collaboratively in cohorts to share resources, promising practices, and participate in professional networking opportunities.
- 2. Add voter registration (local and out-of-state) information to our institutional website.
- 3. Institutionalize the practice of sending a letter to all students every semester about the importance of being civically engaged and participating in elections.
- 4. Build a relationship with the local Board of Elections and identify ways for students to become more involved in the election process i.e. serving as a poll worker, etc.
- 5. Create a pledge to vote campaign encouraging students to identify key social issues, causes, or reasons they care about and asking them to commit to showing up at the polls for election days.
- 6. Create and implement a marketing campaign for RoadrunnerServe, a volunteer management software, in fall 2018 to help students connect to volunteer and co-curricular service learning opportunities.
- 7. Expand Constitution Day programming to be a week of formal programming encompassing Constitution Day and Citizenship Day (on or around September 17th). This week of programming will include a variety of speakers, discussions, voter registration, and voter education activities promoting local, state, and national elections to encourage ongoing democratic engagement.

GOALS: LONG TERM

- 1. Increase student voter registration by 5 percentage points from 2012 NSLVE data by 2020.
- 2. Increase student voting rates by 5 percentage points from rom 2012 NSLVE data by 2020.
- 3. Identify and utilize additional assessment methods for civic learning and democratic engagement beyond NSLVE.
- 4. Identify ways to promote and implement ease of access to voting by providing details and transportations to local voting sites and researching the feasibility of students living on campus being able to utilize the oncampus polling site they are currently assigned to an off-campus site.

STRATEGYFOR CIVIC LEARNING & DEMOCRATIC ENGAGEMENT

STRATEGY

We have opted to split our campus strategy into three separate categories to reflect the layout of our executive summary and to ensure we are working towards encouraging all Roadrunners to become:

- 1. Civically Engaged,
- 2. Politically Engaged, and
- 3. Democratically Engaged.

As a method to increase civic learning and democratic engagement. Each of the following slides will highlight learning outcomes associated with these three categories and strategies for achieving these learning outcomes.



STRATEGY 1: CIVICALLY ENGAGED

1.1 CONSTITUTION WEEK

Dalton State hosts an annual Constitution Day event on or around September 17th. This year, 2018, we will extend this to be a week of programming themed around the constitution and voting. Events will include, constitution cab (golf cart) trivia, constitutional reading, a meet the candidates event, and a keynote speaker event educating students on the voting process and impact.

1.2 ALTERNATIVE BREAK TRIPS

Host at least three alternative break trips for students to immerse in diverse environments. This enables students to experience, discuss, and understand social issues in a significant way encouraging them to take action in their own communities. These trips will be held during fall, Martin Luther King, and spring breaks.

1.3 HUNGER & HOMELESSNESS AWARENESS WEEK

Host the inaugural Hunger and Homelessness Awareness week to educate students on social and civil issues surrounding food insecurity and housing. Examples of programs that may be offered this week include The Hunger Banquet, The Sleep Out Challenge, or a Campus Food Drive Competition.

1.4 VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT

Launch A RoadrunnerServe, volunteer management portal, marketing campaign to help students connect with volunteer and civic engagement opportunities on and off campus.



2.1 VOTER REGISTRATION & STAFF TRAINING

We will have trained student leaders or community partners present during all voter registration drives to discuss the importance of voter registration and to answer student questions. Voter registration drives will be held in collaboration with all civic, political, or democratic engagement campus events.

2.2 COLLABORATIONS WITH FACULTY

Work with political science faculty and their students to create and distribute a campus voting guide available to students.

2.3 VOTER EDUCATION

Host one "Meet the Candidate Event" for each general election.

 - Sample ballots
 - Local poll locations
 - o Information on events related to voter registration, education, and turnout
- Create a student friendly website showing them how to become a registered voter as well as provide resources to keep them updated and informed.
- Provide shuttles to nearby polling stations for students without transportation.
- Host a social media campaign or competition encouraging students to report out when they have voted.
- Host a "Meet the Candidate Event" for all general elections (local and state).
