



2020 CAMPUS ACTION PLAN

FOR CIVIC LEARNING AND DEMOCRATIC ENGAGEMENT

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Dalton State's Campus Action Plan for Civic Learning and Democratic Engagement (CLDE) is coordinated by the Office of Student Life under the direction of the Assistant Director for Leadership and Civic Engagement. Dalton State created an inaugural Campus Action Plan for 2019 to help establish a formalized and intentional plan to increase civic learning and democratic engagement by encouraging all Roadrunners (aka Dalton State students, faculty, and staff) to become civically engaged, politically engaged, and democratically engaged.

Civically engaged Roadrunners will become:

- Aware of personal identities and how they influence civic values, assumptions, and responsibilities;
- Engaged in civic opportunities on and off campus;
- Educated on social and civic issues.

Politically engaged Roadrunners will become:

- educated on the local, state, and national political process;
- aware of local legislators and politicians;
- active in the local, state, and national political process.

Democratically engaged Roadrunners will become:

- active and registered voters;
- better educated on the importance of voting;
- knowledgeable on where and how to vote;

actual voters for local, state, and federal elections.

After reviewing the results of the 2019 Campus Action Plan, we were able to see increased participation and engagement across campus resulting in a 28.9% voting rate, increased volunteerism rate of 312% from the previous year, and a 64.22% participant increase for CLDE programs hosted on campus.

Therefore, we have opted to further these initiatives by developing a second campus action plan helping our team to keep CLDE work a priority for Dalton State. We hope that by strengthening and expanding collaborative efforts with academic affairs, this action plan will be able to help students connect and extend knowledge (facts, theories, etc.) from their academic study/field/discipline to civic engagement and one's own participation in civic life, politics, and government. The 2020 Campus Action Plan will be implemented January 2020 through December 2020.

LEADERSHIP

The coalition is staffed by SAVE Leaders (Students Advocating for Volunteer Efforts) who are committed to enhancing campus life by developing and executing programs and initiatives designed to advance campus and community engagement, provide civic-based learning opportunities, and create opportunities for powerful partnerships that foster positive social change.

However, they do not attend recurring meetings held by the student committees.

ALTERNATIVE BREAKS

Alternative Breaks strive to connect and sends groups of Dalton State students to engage in affordable community-based service projects during college breaks, providing opportunities for students to learn about the problems faced by members of communities with whom they may otherwise have had little to no direct contact. This immersion in diverse environments enables students to experience, discuss, and understand social issues in a significant way encouraging them to take action in their own communities.

Responsibilities of this committee include:

Dalton State is a chapter member of Break Away. Break Away: the Alternative Break Connection, Inc. is a national nonprofit organization that supports the development of quality alternative break programs by providing training and information primarily to colleges, universities, and nonprofit organizations interested in creating lifelong active citizens through these intensive service-learning programs.

CIVIC LEARNING AND DEMOCRATIC ENGAGEMENT

The Civic Learning and Democratic Engagement (CLDE) committee promotes engaged citizenship through democratic participation and social responsibility by creating awareness campaigns, educational programming, and professional development that provide fellow Roadrunners with the knowledge, skills, and abilities to make a difference in their communities. The CLDE committee will plan and execute projects, events, and initiatives to meet all aspects of the Campus Plan for Democratic Engagement.

Responsibilities of this committee include:

- Overseeing, implementing, and assessing the campus engagement plan
- Constitution Week Programs
- Voter Registration, Education, and Engagement

This committee has several programs throughout the year where they rely on faculty participation and collaborations.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND OUTREACH

The Community Engagement and Volunteer Relations committee will focus on community engagement and volunteer initiatives that will help create and maintain a culture of community engagement at Dalton State College. This committee's primary responsibility will be recruiting, training, and connecting student volunteers to local agencies in need.

Responsibilities of this committee include:

- Serve as student administrators to the RoadrunnerServe Volunteer Management Portal
- Day for Dalton Events (Fall & Spring)
- 9/11 National Day of Service and Memorial Ceremony (Fall)
- Community Action Days (Coordinated Service Projects)
- The Big Event (Spring)

COMMITMENT

This action plan will directly support the institution's Strategic Plan Goal III: Colleges are a vital part of their communities. Dalton State College will continue to enhance its engagement with its region and beyond by providing leadership, ideas, innovation, and diverse viewpoints to support its service area. This plan is shared publicly on the Dalton State Website.

- 3.1 Dalton State College will enhance and coordinate partnerships with the Technical College System of Georgia, K-12 systems, local and state agencies, nonprofits, and businesses, as well as institutions that promote economic development and entrepreneurship.
- 3.3 Dalton State College will commit to service that has mutual and educational benefits through service learning and volunteerism involving students, faculty, and staff.
- 3.4 Dalton State College will contribute to the vibrancy of the community by providing a variety of events, programs, and activities while encouraging collaboration and shared resources.

In addition to the Institutional strategic plan, Dalton State exemplifies a commitment to increasing civic learning and democratic engagement through the following ways:

Institutional Commitment:

- Authorization to participate in the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE)
- Collaborative initiatives involving faculty & staff across campus
- Dedicated student life staff member to advise and support student leaders serving on the coalition

Student Commitment:

- Committed and dedicated group of student leaders to lead the initiative and enact the campus plan - SAVE Leaders.
- These students will initiate and foster collaborations with other constituents on and off campus.

Community Partners:

- Various community partners who provide community engagement opportunities to students, faculty, and staff.
- Partnership with local board of elections to provide updated list of candidates and sample ballots prior to each election.
- Partnership with Women League of Voters to assist with voter registration drives.

LANDSCAPE

Dalton State's current landscape regarding civic learning and democratic engagement on campus:

Curricular: All students are required to complete learning goals under the institutions core curriculum. Two of the core curriculum learning outcomes include:

- "Students will articulate an understanding of major forces and events, influences, or ideas that have shaped history and society."
- "students will articulate the constitutional principles and governmental processes fundamental to American democracy and political participation."

Co-Curricular: Student Life promotes students to become civically, politically, and democratically engaged by participating in a series of co-curricular opportunities including:

- Ongoing voter registration opportunities including a Voter Registration Campus Takeover on National Voter Registration Day
- Annual Constitution Day Event(s)
- A "Meet the Candidates" event for local and state elections
- Community Action Days and Days of Service are held to encourage and promote civic engagement on a regular basis

The only data Dalton State is currently utilizing to track and share democratic engagement on campus is gathered through the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE). Here is a snapshot of Dalton State's most recent NSLVE data on voting and registration rates:

- Voting & Registration Rates 46.8%. +28.9 change from 2014
- Voting Method: 38.1% Absentee and 61.3% In-Person Election Day
- Voting by Age Group:
 - 18-21 (44.5% +30.0 from 2014)
 - 22-24 (46.2% +29.4 from 2014)
 - 25-29 (46.7% +29.1 from 2014)
 - 30-39 (47.2% +24.2 from 2014)
 - 40-49 (57.6% +22.7 from 2014)
 - 50+ (74.5% +13.9 from 2014)
- Voting by Enrollment Status:
 - 46.2% full time +29.3 from 2014
 - 45.3% part time +26.7 from 2014
- Voting by Gender:
 - 47.7% Women +30.8 from 2014
 - 47.8% Men +29.6 from 2014
- Voting by Race/Ethnicity
 - 14.9% Asian
 - 26.5% Black +18 from 2014
 - 49.6% Hispanic +40.2 from 2014
 - 50% White +29.4% from 2014

- 34.8% Two or More Races

As a committee and campus, we will need to work together to complete an analysis of the NSLVE data trend to further develop its implications on our campus action plan. This was planned for spring 2020 but was postponed due to COVID-19. We will re-schedule in the coming month(s).

GOALS

SHORT TERM

1. Add voter registration (local and out-of-state) information to our institutional website.
2. Institutionalize the practice of sending a letter to all students every semester about the importance of being civically engaged and participating in elections.
3. Build a relationship with the local Board of Elections and identify ways for students to become more involved in the election process i.e. serving as a poll worker, etc.
4. Create opportunities for student to become more aware and educated about key issues appearing on ballots for their designated voting precinct.
5. Collaborate with faculty to establish a series of events encouraging conversations across difference in relation to civic, political, or democratic engagement.
6. Host a Skills Workshop through Better Angels at Dalton State to help students, faculty, and staff develop skills needed for having respectful conversations that clarify differences, search for common ground, and affirm the importance of having better conversations with people on the other side of the political aisle.
7. Dalton State will register as a commitment campus for the “Ask Every Student” initiative and strive for 100% student voter participation of eligible students.

LONG TERM

1. Increase student voter registration by 10 percentage points from 2018 NSLVE data to 2020 NSLVE data.
2. Increase student voting rates by 10 percentage points from 2018 NSLVE data to 2020 NSLVE data.
3. Identify and utilize additional assessment methods for civic learning and democratic engagement beyond NSLVE.
4. Identify ways to promote and implement ease of access to voting by providing details and transportations to local voting sites and researching the feasibility of students living on campus being able to utilize the on-campus polling site - they are currently assigned to an off-campus site.
