



Dartmouth College 2024 Democratic Engagement Action Plan Developed by: Ed McKenna with guidance and feedback from the Dartmouth Votes Coalition

Executive Summary

This nonpartisan democratic engagement action plan was developed the Student Life Liaison for the Dartmouth Votes program at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire for the 2024 election. The purpose of this action plan is to outline goals and actions toward increasing nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter registration, education, and turnout during the 2024 Primaries, local elections, and the 2024 general election. Utilizing a shared document, the coalition has outlined, reviewed, and assigned twenty-nine goals for the 2024 calendar year. Some of these goals include:

- Implementing an ask-every-student model and educating them about registration and voting policies and processes;
- facilitating voter registration for all eligible students;
- facilitating and supporting voting efforts for all eligible students;
- maintaining our strong relationship with local election supervisors;
- holding registration and informational events;
- facilitating access to local polling places;
- removing challenges and/or barriers to voting for marginalized groups;
- increasing eligible voter turnout from 79% in 2020 to at least 85% in 2024;
- increasing turnout for the lowest three academic concentrations by at least 5%;
- working with senior administration to ensure civic engagement is seen as a necessary component of the student experience and, therefore, built into the co- and extra- curricular infrastructures of the College.

Broadly, the goals for the Dartmouth Votes Coalition at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire for the 2024 election are: expand, ingrain, educate. This work began during the fall of 2023, has continued through the Winter Term, and will be ongoing through the general election.

Campus Commitment

Dartmouth's recently inaugurated president noted: "To supplement that work, I have just joined College Presidents for Civic Preparedness. It's a group committed to ensuring today's young people are well-informed, productively engaged citizens and to measuring discourse on campus." President Sian Beilock is setting a precedent as to the importance of civic engagement in curriculum and programming at Dartmouth. Additionally, President Beilock created a position among senior leadership dedicated to strengthening the institution's ties with local, state, and federal government entities and local communities- the Vice President for Government and Community Relations. The Vice President's liaising and leadership has helped streamline conversations and collaboration with the Town of Hanover. And the President has consistently posted or reposted registration and voting information on her social media channels. With The Dartmouth Civics Student Association up and running, the Dartmouth Votes Coalition has not only grown but is able to connect with and educate students more readily and consistently.

Finally, Dartmouth College has been a signatory to the Higher Education Presidents' Commitment to Full Student Voter Participation since 2020.

Landscape

Dartmouth College is a private 4-year institution and joined the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge in 2020. The Dartmouth Votes Coalition has made significant efforts to brand itself throughout campus including maintaining web-pages, handing out and making available Dartmouth Votes magnets and fliers. Additionally, the Dartmouth Civics Student Association

reserved tables several times during the winter term 2024, connected with hundreds of students while doing so, and handed out fliers after a Liz Cheney appearance on campus. Dartmouth Votes, and voting information in general, is well-received, shared often, and easily accessible. It is become well-integrated into campus culture. And senior administration is very supportive.

Our campus demographic and voting data:

Dartmouth College has 7,204 students, including 4,905 undergraduates and 2,299 graduate students. Male/Female ratio = 49.7%/50.3%; undergraduate enrollment consists of 47.1% white students, 13.5% Asian, 9.6% Hispanic, 13.88% International, 5.96% Black; 97% of students are from out of state and 15% are from out of country.

Dartmouth College has authorized NSLVE.

Our institution had a 2020 campus voting rate of 79.1%. Our institution had a 2020 voter registration rate of 89.5%.

Our institution had a 2018 voter turnout rate of 54.3%. Our institution had a 2018 voter registration rate of 83%.

Goals

Our campus democratic engagement goals are:

Goal 1: Increase student voting rate % for a midterm election to 60% in 2022 from 54% in 2018 and in a presidential election cycle from 79% in 2020 to 85% in 2024. Goal 2: Increase student voter registration rate to 90% in 2022 and 95% in 2024.

Additional goals are outlined in the Index.

NSLVE

We are relying on the NSLVE available to guide coalition goals. We have not yet received the 2022 NSLVE. We share all NSLVE reports with campus.

Strategy

Dartmouth College will implement these strategies to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter participation.

Expand: The Dartmouth Votes Coalition aims to expand its reach on campus and in the community through consistent messaging and marketing efforts; by holding voter

registration/education events; coordinating and executing town and gown events; hosting local candidate forums; co-sponsoring events with organizations representing historically marginalized groups; solidifying partnerships and co-hosting events with the Office of Pluralism and Leadership, Athletics, and Greek Life; working with members of senior administration to assist in communicating across campus.

Ingrain: Building upon and continuing efforts to ensure civic engagement is a consistent and integral aspect of the student experience, the Dartmouth Votes Coalition seeks to ingrain its message into additional facets of the College including the registrar's office, residential life, and in the classroom. We made significant progress during the fall of 2023, as civic engagement was messaged to all incoming students during orientation online and in-person.

Educate: Along with increased marketing efforts including the printing and distribution of pamphlets, videos, and magnets, the coalition will hold events intended to educate and register; table in high-traffic areas; and partner with offices and departments to disseminate voting and registration information. Directing students to up-to-date web pages will also aid in these education efforts.

Specific to the strategies above, Dartmouth Civics held 5-10 tabling events in the lead-up to the Jan 23rd primary. Additionally, the Dartmouth Votes Coalition hosted another voter education and registration event on January 8th with co-sponsors, as it did in November 2023, with organizations representing traditionally marginalized students, including the NAACP student chapter, Delta Sigma Theta, Omega Psi Phi, and Alpha Phi Alpha. Over 100 students registered to vote at the previous event and countless others visited and asked questions. The Dartmouth Votes Coalition meets regularly to outline action plans, deadlines, etc.

Evaluation

We will evaluate our action plan in the following ways:

The Dartmouth Votes Coalition will lead the evaluation effort while also engaging with campus partners to gauge programmatic outreach and efficacy. This will help steer actions related to outlined goals and guide conversations with senior leadership about expanding voter registration and education efforts. Additionally, we will use data from NSLVE, tracking of election-day engagements, and consult with Town officials to gauge student voter turnout. A post-election survey to assess engagement will enable us to understand the how, why, and when of student engagement as well.
