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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Jefferson Community College (JCC) is a public community college in Watertown, New York. The College was established in 1961. It is the only higher education campus located within a 50-mile radius of Watertown.

The college offers over 40 associate degrees and certificates. Our programs are career-technical based and transferrable for a bachelor's degree. We enroll about 1,300 full and part-time students each semester. The campus is located 10 miles from Fort Drum Army base.

Our mission at JCC is to Educate. Inspire. Empower. We believe that fostering an open and engaging environment during this election season will allow our students to become stronger, well informed global citizens.

The ALL-In Democracy Action Plan was developed by Tanya Hoistion, Coordinator Student Accommodations & Testing Services and Matthew Gorman, Interim Director Student Activities. The purpose of this action plan is to increase nonpartisan democratic engagements and student voter registration, education, and turnout in the 2024 election. This action plan is for the 2024-2025 Academic year and all the events will be held on campus. The goals for Jefferson Community College for the 2024 election are:

- 1. Host events that encourage voter registration.
- 2. Promote democracy and why it is important for students to understand the voting process and their civic duty.
- 3. Create a welcoming and encouraging environment during the election season for students, faculty, and staff.
- 4. Empower students to vote.

LEADERSHIP

The offices of Student Activities and Accommodative Services serve as the primary resources on campus for voter registration. In collaboration with Academics, they host programs that support civic engagement and voter education. Student Activities and Accommodative Services will be the primary offices to implement this action plan.


Secure financial sustainability through organizational efficiencies, best practices, and innovative initiatives.

LANDSCAPE

JCC's voting rates as indicated in the 2022 NSLVE report, have improved by 0.3% from 2018. Our goal for the 2024 election is to have an increase of 8% and have a voting rate of 27%.



The following list is of co-curricular programs that have a civic/democratic engagement piece:

<u>INT 111</u>- This is a course that all students must take. It is a college foundations course that is based on the student's major. The class focuses on study skills, academic planning, basic research, and campus resources. The students are mandated to attend so many events on campus as part of the course. There are also guest speakers for the classes depending on the major.

<u>Student Activities</u>- This office promotes student participation in events that encourage social interaction, social responsibility, leadership, education, cultural awareness, DEI awareness, and civic engagement. Voter registration is available in the office. Student clubs within this organization enhance the student experience and promote awareness.

- LGBT+ Club host activities that promote healthy interactions and awareness of the community on campus. They provide a supportive network and welcoming environment for students.
- Veterans Club is one of the largest clubs on our campus. It is comprised of veterans, family members, staff, faculty, and non-military affiliated students. They host several events that promote unity, civic engagement, and a sense of community for many students on campus.
- Student Government Association (SGA) represents the student body to the administration. They sponsor all the clubs, campus- wide events/activities, they serve on campus committees, and they allocate programming money to student organizations.

<u>Accommodative Services Office (ASO)</u> - This office provides reasonable accommodations for students with disabilities. It also is a Voter Registration site where students can receive assistance completing the voter registration application. The ASO also hosts events throughout the semester that encourage students to become a global citizen withing our school and community. They also provide referrals to outside agencies.

<u>JCC Public Service</u> – JCC employees believe in our mission. As part of that mission, employees strive to engage in public service that benefits our community. Many faculty and staff volunteer with local service organizations, non-profit boards, government

units, local and county legislators, faith-based communities, and other civic-minded organizations.

<u>Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee</u> (DEI) – This committee is comprised of multiple faculty members, staff, and students. The purpose of this committee is to promote and educate the campus community on DEI. They will work with other groups on campus to provide programming and events.

<u>Barriers to success:</u> Jefferson Community College is a rural, predominantly white campus. The college serves three counties, and we also have a large military base within 10 miles of the campus. We try to advertise where polling places are in the various counties, however, there are many individuals that get confused. We do provide a handout out with the counties Board of Elections. We also provide information for absentee ballots. The last election was during COVID, and it was difficult to disseminate information and host events.

GOALS

Jefferson Community College has the following goals for civic learning and democratic engagement:

- 1. Increase the voting rates of students. This goal will be achieved by:
 - a. Hosting events on a scheduled basis each semester.
 - b. Provide voter registration information in INT 111.
 - c. Have special programs (Opportunity Programs, Athletes, etc.) provide voting information to their cohort.
- 2. Promote and foster a learning environment that discusses civic learning and engagement.
 - a. Host open forums about the democratic process, voter registration and civic responsibilities.
 - b. Add a civic learning activity/assignment in INT 111.
 - c. Have local politicians come and have a speaking engagement.

- 3. Expand access to voting for diverse students.
 - a. The Accommodative Services Office offers assistance for students with disabilities.
 - b. Provide voter registration applications in various languages to reflect our student demographics.
 - c. Create marketing materials in the same languages.

As stated in JCC's mission statement, values, and key strategies, we want to have students become global citizens. We believe that achieving the above goals will empower the students to become global citizens.

STRATEGY

Jefferson Community College will implement the following strategies to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter participation:

- Increase posters and date reminders all over campus about the 2024 election.
- Signage in all buildings of where to access voter registration forms.
- Host a contest on National Voter Registration Day. Both students and faculty will be able to participate.

- Participate in all the civic holidays throughout the academic year.
- Create a short video clip of faculty and staff talking about their voting experience and encouraging students to vote or register to vote.
- Have an event with Boomer (our mascot) with some giveaways about voting and reminders.
- Implement a new student survey assessment regarding civic engagement.
- Host an Art contest- student who can create the best voting poster (3 winners).
- Work collaboratively with the academic departments to incorporate civic learning and engagement into the INT 111 class.
- Collaborate with our local board of elections and local politician to have guest speakers on campus.

REPORTING

The All-In Action Plan for 2024 will be shared first with the Academic Leadership and our Board of Trustees. After approval from senior administration, it will be shared with the campus. We will form a committee to complete the implementation of the report. The Action Plan will be available on our website and in the student portal. Data will be collected throughout the academic year and a final report will be written in the month of June 2025. The report will include the 2024 NSLVE report. The completed report will go to senior administration.

EVALUATION

Evaluation will play an integral part in our Action Plan. Evaluating will tell us how we are doing with our civic learning and engagement efforts. We will be able to see if our efforts are providing an increase or decrease in student engagement and voter registration. The evaluation process will be ongoing throughout the academic year.

At any event, we will be able to take attendance and record the data. During the voter registration, we will be able to count the number of completed applications we received. The Student Activities Office and the Accommodative Services Office will be able to give semester data on how many applications were given to students. We will also be able to view the number of "clicks" on the student portal regarding voter registration.

In the future, we need to create a survey for students regarding voting. This will give us baseline data that we can use to make appropriate goals for the next election year.
