Keuka College 2022 Campus Action Plan

Goal: Keuka College's goal is to develop a democratic engagement action plan that involves students, faculty, staff, and local election partners in civic and electoral engagement. Additionally, Keuka College aims to give students the proper resources to help them navigate their political beliefs. Furthermore, we strive to encourage as many students as possible to execute their right to vote and strengthen efforts that help students overcome barriers to participating in the political process.

Coalition: Our coalition will be the Voter Registration Committee. This committee will be composed of the Director of Student Leadership & Engagement, the Director of Inclusion and Belonging, the Assistant Director of Inclusion and Belonging, a Professor of Political Science, a Student Senate Representative, a Multicultural Student Association Representative, a PRIDE Club representative, and a Campus Activities Board Representative. This team is scheduled to evolve and grow as needed to include various departments and communities. Operations of the Voter Registration Committee will be assisted by the KC Squad, a campus wide team of professionals and students that focus on campus wide programming. The Voter Registration Committee will delegate to different departments across the Student Life division as needed in partnership with the Associate Vice President/Dean of Students.

Description of Work:

- Increase Voter Registration
 - Tabling for Voter Registration at major events including New Student Orientation, Fall Semester Move-In Day, Party in the Park, Green & Gold Weekend, Fall Festival, Voter Registration Day, and Wolf Madness.
 - Incentivizing students to register with prizes (T-shirts, Raffles, Games, etc.)
 - Recording student attendance at programs/events related to voter registration to assess changes in civic engagement and participation.
- Increase Voter Education
 - Modeling ways that students can debate issues passionately and engage in open dialogues respectfully with one another, while tolerating alternative points of view, utilizing campus programs such as "Hmm...Hadn't Thought of That" and "Know Your Neighbor". We will involve Yates County Democrats and Yates County Republicans to educate participants on varying viewpoints and engage in bipartisan discussions of relevant policies and legislation.
 - Focusing on civic responsibility through programs which engage in open dialogues with the community.
 - Marketing materials and campaigns designed to increase awareness regarding civic engagement and legislation.
 - Working with political science faculty to ensure classes are challenging students to put together information from multiple reliable sources and students are engaged academically in current events and political activity in the community.
 - Familiarizing students with voting protocols and ballots through programming and marketing campaigns.
- Voter Turnout
 - Holding a community celebration on Election Day through the Campus Activities Board.
 - Working with Campus Activities Board (CAB) to create programs
 - Incorporating Residence Hall programming (Residence Hall Challenge) to engage students and build community within their residence halls.
- Students as Voter Advocates
 - Identifying, training, and developing student leaders to be ambassadors (Peer Mentors, Campus Activities, Student Senate, and other interested students).
 - Educating on self-advocacy.
 - Engaging students through various social media platforms to encourage peers to vote and participate in activities.
