ABOUT MOUNT SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY LOS ANGELES

Our founders climbed this mountain with a vision for educating and empowering women.

We're the Mount. And we're Unstoppable.

Mount Saint Mary's is the only women's university in Los Angeles and one of the most diverse in the nation. Mount Saint Mary's University was founded in 1925 by the **Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet** (CSJs), a group of bold visionary educators who sought to establish an institution of higher learning where women could become leaders dedicated to service, justice and knowledge. Rooted in a **rich history** that dates to 1650 in Le Puy, France, CSJs have always been trailblazers. Our past, present and future are shaped by the mission of the sisters - to respond to the needs of the times. Today, Mount Saint Mary's is the **only women's university in Los Angeles** and one of the most diverse and transformative in the nation. The Mount is recognized nationally for its academic quality, research on gender equity, innovative health and science programs, empowerment of women, leadership development and commitment to social justice.

In 1928, the sisters purchased 36 acres that stretched among the foothills of the Santa Monica mountains, which would become the Chalon Campus. Today, the **Chalon Campus** houses most of the University's traditional undergraduate programs and the first women's leadership program established in the western United States. In 1962, the University expanded to its second campus on the historic Doheny Estate near downtown Los Angeles. The **Doheny**

Campus is home to the Mount's graduate degree programs, associate in arts programs, education credential program, and the Weekend/Evening & Online College. The University has graduated **more than 24,000 students**. Mount Saint Mary's graduates are engaged, active, global citizens who use their knowledge and skills to better themselves, their communities, and the world.

The University is known nationally for its research on gender equity, its innovative health and science programs, and its commitment to community service. Mount Saint Mary's University offers a dynamic learning experience in the liberal arts and sciences to a diverse student body. As a Catholic university primarily for women, we provide a superior education enhanced by an emphasis on building leadership skills and fostering a spirit to serve others. Our measure of success is graduates who are committed to using their knowledge and skills to better themselves, their environments, and the world. As one of the most diverse universities in the nation, we believe that diversity and social justice are fundamental components of educational excellence and the advancement of knowledge. Mount Saint Mary's University, Los Angeles is committed to becoming an antiracist university that pursues equity, diversity, justice, and belonging. We acknowledge that all aspects of our culture and institution are impacted by structural racism. We seek to address the policies and practices that lead to inequities across the university. GOALS

- Long Term
 - Neighborhood Polling Location at the Doheny Campus
 - o Ensure 90% Student Registration beginning fall 2024.
 - Increase turnout for students who vote at lower rates by offering tailored resources and support.
 - Build the habit of political participation by engaging first-time voters, including first-generation U.S. citizens and first-generation college students.
 - Enhance get-out-the-vote efforts to increase overall voting rates.
- Short Term
 - o Ballot Box Drop Off's on Campus- Chalon and Doheny.
 - o 650 students complete online pledge to vote.
 - o Increase on sight voter registration by 30%.
 - o Classroom Partnerships with faculty in various majors.
 - Facilitate 25 one-on-ones with student leaders to nurture meaningful partnerships and programming through their club efforts.
 - o 50% increase in the number of students applying for internships/programs and conferences regarding political life, policy development, and lobbying.

STRATEGY

- Voter Registration/Check Your Status Drives "Are You Ready?"
 - New Student Orientation, June/August 2023 June/August 2024
 - Incoming students will have the option to register to vote as part of a
 required orientation session. MSMUVotes will review the options for
 voter registration (at home or on campus), walk students through the
 form, answer questions and collect completed forms.

 Quarterly Residential Life Connects - program in which a Civics Team member pairs with a Community Assistant to ensure that residents have programming to allow them to register or check status.

Civic Holidays

- o Constitution Day September
 - As part of the Constitution Day celebration, a table will be set up to engage students outside the University Union. In addition to voter registration efforts, this event will include opportunities for students to articulate why voting matters and contribute to a social media campaign. Copies of the U.S. Constitution will be distributed, and students, faculty and staff can participate in activities. We will also decorate one dining hall on campus.
- o National Voter Registration Day September
 - National Voter Registration Day activities will include voter registration
 in a prominent location, a campus-wide email with voting information,
 partnerships with student organizations, social media outreach and
 more. We will also decorate the Chalon Student Lounge and Doheny
 Cafe on campus celebrations on each campus with information on

voting, checking status, registering. In addition to learning about upcoming elections and candidates on the ballots.

- National Voter Education Week October
 - Social media engagement throughout fall break week on how to educate, advocate, and prepare to be #voteready.
- November Election Day
 - Ensure that students vote at their correct poll site, drop ballots at a
 ballot drop box and host a MSMUVotes information table at the campus
 poll site on Election Day. Volunteers will be trained with information
 about student voter rights and how to address common issues that
 student voters may encounter. Students who live off campus will receive
 detailed information about how to get to their correct poll site and how
 to drop ballots if necessary.

 - An official University email will be sent in September, reminding students of their right to register to vote and providing information on how to do so.
 - In addition to voter registration emails, we will send an Election Day email to all students through the University's official email communication tool as well as through the Student Government Association.
- Pledge to vote Using the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge's online pledge to vote tool, we will encourage students to make a commitment to vote and will offer drawings for students who participate. We will also consider hosting campus-based competitions (by college, academic program, living community, etc.) to generate excitement. For an extra drawing, students will be challenged to remind three friends to vote.
- Important California Dates
 - Voter Registration Online or Postmark by February 20, 2024. You can "conditionally" register and vote at your county elections office after the 15-day voter registration deadline.
 - o Vote-by-Mail Ballot Request Must arrive by February 27, 2024
 - o Election Date March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election
 - Completed Ballots Including Vote-by-Mail Ballots Personally delivered ballots: Must be delivered by close of polls on March 5, 2024; Mailed ballots: Must be postmarked on or before March 5, 2024, and received by your county elections office no later than March 12, 2024.

ASSESSMENT

Data collection and tracking is ongoing, and formal assessment processes take place at the end of each semester. Evaluation results are shared with campus and community partners, and some data (such as the number of students registered and changes in turnout rates) are shared more widely to both celebrate and strengthen our work.

- National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE) will participate in NSLVE to track student voting rates and utilize data to expand programming efforts to targeted student populations.
- 2. Identify learning outcomes and assess student learning through surveys and notes on quality and depth of discussion and reflection, in addition to tracking attendance.
- 3. Conduct a debrief after every event and at the end of each semester to go over what worked well, what needs improvement and potential changes for the future. This includes post-event surveys for all participants. Following a debrief meeting, the point person will complete an event summary which will detail the event, debrief discussion, and include any primary metrics and outcomes.

REPORTING

This report will be shared with campus and community partners as well as other higher education institutions interested in strengthening their own voter engagement work.

The plan is posted publicly with national partners, such as the All in Challenge and

Voter Friendly Campus and will be shared on the MSMUVotes website and ENGAGE Student Portal. The report will also be shared with university partners, trustees, and administration including the President's Cabinet.

Student leaders who are involved in democratic engagement will be doing a formal university report and sharing via live stream with the Mount community.
