- 3. Organize three community service projects per semester through the Turley Center.

Long-Term Goals:

- 1. Achieve a 75% voter turnout rate among registered students by the 2028 presidential election.
- 2. Develop sustained partnerships with five new Memphis community organizations by 2025.

6. Strategy

Voter Registration and Education:

- Host voter registration drives during major campus events.
- Incorporate voter education and registration into freshman orientation (if they live on campus they can vote in Memphis, but they can also vote absentee).

Community Service and Engagement:

- Partner with local organizations to provide hands-on service opportunities.
- Create service-learning courses that connect academic content with civic engagement.

Civic Learning Integration:

- Offer workshops and seminars on civic topics through the Turley Center.
- Encourage faculty to include civic engagement components in their syllabi.

Communication and Outreach:

- Use social media and campus newsletters to promote civic activities.
- Engage student leaders to advocate for participation in civic events.

7. Reporting & Evaluation

Data Collection:

- Short term goal: Our community partner Memphis For All/Tennessee For All tracks all registered students in their database and follows up with registrants to help educate on issues and creating plan to vote.
- Long term goal: Achieve institutional support to track voter registration and turnout rates through NSLVE
- Monitor participation in civic engagement events and courses.

Evaluation Methods:

- Conduct surveys to assess student attitudes towards civic engagement.
- Review feedback from community partners on the impact of service projects.

Reporting:

- Annual reports on civic engagement progress to college administration and nonprofit stakeholders.
- Share success stories and challenges in college publications.

8. Resources

Support and Funding:

- Secure funding through college budget allocations, department budgets, and Project Pericles civic engagement grants.
- Provide training for faculty and staff on integrating civic engagement into their work with the assistance of TNCDN.
- Utilizing the national student voting movement's vast resource library through partnerships with ALL IN, Campus Vote Project, and the Students Learn Students Vote Coalition.

Tools and Materials:

- Access to voter registration resources and educational materials.
- Facilities for hosting civic events and meetings.

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
