Solano Community College Civic Engagement Plan 2024-2025

ABOUT SOLANO COLLEGE

Solano College (SCC) is part of California's public community college system with a main campus in Fairfield, California. The College's service area encompasses the communities of Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield, Suisun, Vacaville, Vallejo, Winters, and Travis Air Force Base. Many graduates of the area's fifteen public high schools and three private schools take advantage of the educational opportunities offered by Solano Community College. This institution serves approximately 9,500 students, and it provides 120 degrees & 15 certificates. Solano College was previously registered as an official polling place, and it is our goal to reinstate SCC as a polling place for the 2025-2028 terms.

Executive Summary

Solano Community College's Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan was developed through collaboration between faculty and students. Student ambassador and ASSC Legislative Advocate, AJ Matthews, wrote the draft with guidance from the Interim Director of Student Development and Engagement, Denise Martinez. The Associated Students of Solano College (ASSC), Academic Senate, and the Falcon Taskforce provided critical feedback which advanced the plan. The purpose of this CVEAP is to provide a reliable strategy for dispersing civic educational material in a way that is accessible, safe, and engaging.

We will enact this CVEAP on the Fairfield Campus where our student population is most concentrated. With student engagement data, we will update our strategy and extend support to the Vacaville and Vallejo campuses. We will achieve our goals of voter empowerment through our partnership with the League of Women Voters through the frameworkd of Civic Holidays.

Our college is granting Student Equity funds as well as ASSC funds for civic engagement programming. Over the next two years, we will seek more local and statewide partnerships such as Students Learn Students Vote and Ask Every Student, Pizza to the Polls to offer more opportunities for students to become civically engaged.

BACKGROUND

This Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan is the first to be drafted and implemented at the college. Since COVID, student participation has seen a significant decline. This plan is the foundational document outlining our strategy to boost student participation focused on civic awareness. The school has several established, productive programs such as Rising Scholars, PUENTE, the Accessibility Services Center, and EOPS that reach several students and connect them to tools for success. These groups work to unify students and encourage positive mental and professional development. The Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan (CVEAP) will utilize these established programs to help contribute to a cohesive community where all students feel accepted and empowered.

Collaboration

Falcon Task Force

The Falcon Taskforce will be a team of professors, program coordinators, and club advisors. We will meet once a month to adjust our event strategies and optimize students' civic engagement. During the months leading up to the election, we will advance our strategy for voter registration, promoting community volunteer work, and planning events. When there is no active election, the workgroup continues curating programming centered around civic education to continue advocating for voter empowerment. The Falcon Taskforce will also facilitate civic activities on the Vacaville and Vallejo campuses.

Strategy

Community outreach: Solano College has partnered with the Solano League of Women Voters chapter. We have hosted collaborative events with the League and encouraged students to join. This partnership will lead to more voluntary community service and student engagement.

Inter-Campus Collaboration: We are working to bridge the divide between our sister campuses by sending ASSC representatives to Vacaville and Vallejo for Open House events. We will offer student government positions, voter registration materials, ballot guides, and information about upcoming events. We will work to utilize these spaces so that the information and opportunities are equally offered to all Solano Community College students.

Publicity: Lana Tayag, ASSC Public Relations Officer, and Christina Lee, the Solano Community College Director of Marketing and Communications, have created brochures, monitor slides, social media posts, and posters to spread awareness about the 2024 election and civic engagement events. We are initiating contact with Greg Poff who directs the Journalism students working in the broadcast room on campus. We plan on filming a civic education PSA for a local channel advertising our event and advocating for youth action. We are also working to support the school paper which has recently been revived.

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Goals

- 1. Student Registration
 - a. We have partnered with Civic Holidays and the League of Women Voters to host civic engagement programming on the Fairfield campus. These events have been effective and attracted students to educational material. We will continue our scheduled programming into the Spring 2025 semester
- Reinstate Solano Community College Fairfield Campus as a registered ballot drop-off location
 - a. Previously, there have been communication issues between the college administration and the Solano County Registrar of Voters. We have sent a proposal to Vice President of Student Services, Lisa Neely, to advocate for the school to accommodate those who would use this location for voting.
 - Once we meet the CROV guidelines, we can become a drop-off location for future elections
 - c. We hope to gain student participation as volunteer poll workers so they can experience the civic process firsthand. Becoming a ballot drop-off location would increase accessibility and convenience for students.
- 3. Integrate Civic Learning into Curriculum

a. We hope that collaboration with the Academic Senate and Curriculum
