


SPC Votes: Civic Equality

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SPC Votes: Civic Equality is an expression of St. Petersburg College's (SPC) institutional commitment to increasing access to civic health & community action. The purpose of this action plan is to promote civic equality and increase student voter participation rates on all eleven campuses across Pinellas County.

As the first community college in the State of Florida, St. Petersburg College (SPC) was founded on an effort to use equity in education as the conduit to end cycles of poverty and increase economic & civic efficacy.

Cultivating a campus and community culture invested in democratic and global citizenship is a priority for SPC.

SPC's Voter Engagement Action Plan is a collaborative plan developed by SPC's Center for Civic Learning and Community Engagement (CCLCE).

As an open-access institution whose hallmark is its commitment to individual and community building we have built civic health into the lens through which SPC operates. In that spirit, the CCLCE is collaborating with college and community partners with the clear goal of increasing non-partisan voter engagement and voter turnout on all 11 campuses across Pinellas County.

This plan is designed to be implemented during the 2023-2024 academic year.

SPC is the very heartbeat of our community. Listening to our neighbors, responding with innovative and reciprocal initiatives, in coursework, curating campus and community events through collaboration with the individuals and communities we serve, will help us implement our plan and increase access to democratic ideals.

COMMITMENT FROM OUR LEADERS

The Board of Trustees and the President have pledged "We will invest in the well-being and growth of our community by serving as a leader, a convener, and a catalyst for positive change."

President Williams as pledged her commitment to working. toward 100% voter registration for the last three years. SPC's. Board of Trustees has evidenced their commitment to civic health by adopting community engagement, which often includes civic education, as part of SPC's **three** visionary commitments; **Academic Excellence, Economic Mobility and Community Engagement.**

We maintain these commitments by creating strong partnerships, participating in civic learning and community engagement, and cultivating a community of care."

SPC's value statements further institutionalizes this commitment by having a community focus & integrity statement that "We cultivate trust, transparency, and equity through personal and institutional ethics, empathy, and compassion." And "We foster and model the principles of inclusion, service, partnership, and **social responsibility** through community engagement to build strong relationships locally and abroad.". These Commitments are guiding principals for our strategic plan, measured and reported to our Board of Directors twice a year, and are part of our legislative performance based funding metrics.

This plan is the continuation of SPC's annual voter engagement Initiatives to increase voter education and voter registration. This year, SPC Votes will place a special emphasis on increasing access to voter ready resources.

This plan includes SPC's commitment to strive toward 100% voter registration and increase access to non-partisan voter education.

The development of this plan has been informed by resources from the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge and its partners in the Students Learn Students Vote (SLSV) Coalition rubric. It has also supported by best practices identified in the Carnegie Classification's application for Community Engagement and collaborative support organizations like Turbo Vote, Campus Vote Project and Civic Inluencer§.4

SPC VOTER ENGAGEMENT PLAN

UNDERSTANDING THE LANDSCAPE & MEASURING PROGRESS

The wide range of economic conditions coupled with the reality of Pinellas County being Florida's first and only built out county poses unique challenges and economically limited opportunities. SPC is compelled to work with the economy and social challenges we have and connect student's community & civic engagement to professional development.

The changing demographics of Pinellas county reflects a growing population of Latino, eastern European and Asian Americans and is in part why we have developed a nimble and responsive approach to civic & community engagement-trying to meet the myriad of needs that exist in our population and within our socio-economically varied service area. SPC's average student age is 28 years old.

Target Marginalized Voters	Voter Registration & GOTV	To inform its election engagement effort, and join the national conversation around this issue, SPC participates in the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE). NLSVE data comparing both voter registration and turnout among eligible SPC students in 2014 and 2018 show that the launch of the CCLCE the adoption of community engagement as a formative and guiding foundational goal contributed to a voter registration increase of 11.5% from 34.1% to 45.6%. SPC's Voter Rate is significantly higher than the 2019 national average of 39.1%. SPC's voter registration efforts are 76% of the student population and the voting rate of registered students is 60%. Overall, while all ethnic/racial groups have consistently increased their voting rates since 2014, a lot of work remains to increase the voting participation of nonwhites. Rates for Asians and Hispanics (48 and 59 respectively) are substantially lower than Whites (69). Blacks are also somewhat lower than Whites by a 69 to 63 margin. Age and gender demonstrates little difference in voting rates.

With the advent of a legislative challenges that have effect voter registration in the state State of Florida SPC is working toward reducing barriers to challenged populations and creating innovative strategies to increase voter registration, voter education and voter turnout.

Priority #1 Voter Registration

LONG TERM:

 Advocate for mandatory voter registration when students register for courses.

SHORT TERM:

- Host Supervisor of Election, LWV & local/national 3rd party voter registration organizations across all 11 campuses once a quarter; more during election years
- Use innovative QR codes to bypass Florida state laws that affect 3rd party registrations
- Continue providing online access to voter registration (CCLE website, Institute for Policy Solutions website and D2L all students interface
- Quarterly voter registration reporting; promote civic holidays on learning platform; Voter registration QR codes/TurboVote and Vote 411 /State Voter

Priority #2 Voter Education & Engagement

LONG TERM:

 Embed learning objectives in each Career & Academic community on how that discipline can inform voter education

Priority # 3 Voter Efficacy & Community Action

Long term:

 Students accept and act on the power of their agency to vote; serve on and off campus, contribute to community and civic organizations, including city or county or neighborhood committees, volunteer in campaign work or non-profit work and most importantly vote.

Short Term:

 GOTV efforts including students serving as peer to peer GOTV advocates serve as election watch workers, poll watchers, phone banks, couch texting parties, Rock the Vote with MIRA program, Rock the Vote with SPC Athletics (warm up t-shirts)

EVALUATION

SPC's Voter Engagement plan is part of SPC's 3-year Strategic Plan. Progress & challenges are reported quarterly to the Board of Trustees. The data is also included in the President's Annual Evaluation & shared in our legislative reporting. Raw data, narrative analysis, & partnership feedback from community partners is all included.




Voter Registration

Voting timeline will be advertised and promoted and online resources will be available

NEXT STEPS

SPC's **CCLCE** will prepare a comprehensive report on each of the actions listed in our voter engagement plan, with quantitative and qualitative data to assess our success, lessons learned, and next steps.

Specific goals include:

- Increase NSLVE registration rates and voting rates by 10% as compared to our 2022 rates, with a targeted goal of increasing marginalized populations by 15%
- Integrate Civic Health & Readiness as a professional development priority for SPC's Discovery Day (October) & Spring Training (February) for all faculty & staff
- Recruit students and staff to serve as poll workers
- Social media campaign with President & Executive Leadership about importance of voting, how to find resources and GOTV efforts
- SPC application or registration to connect with voter registration process
