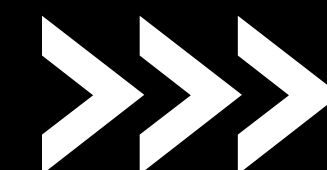

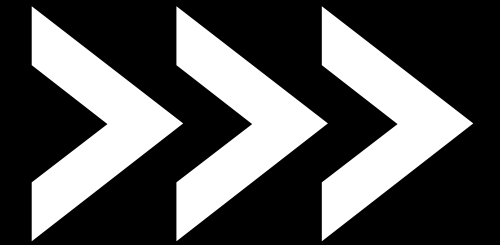

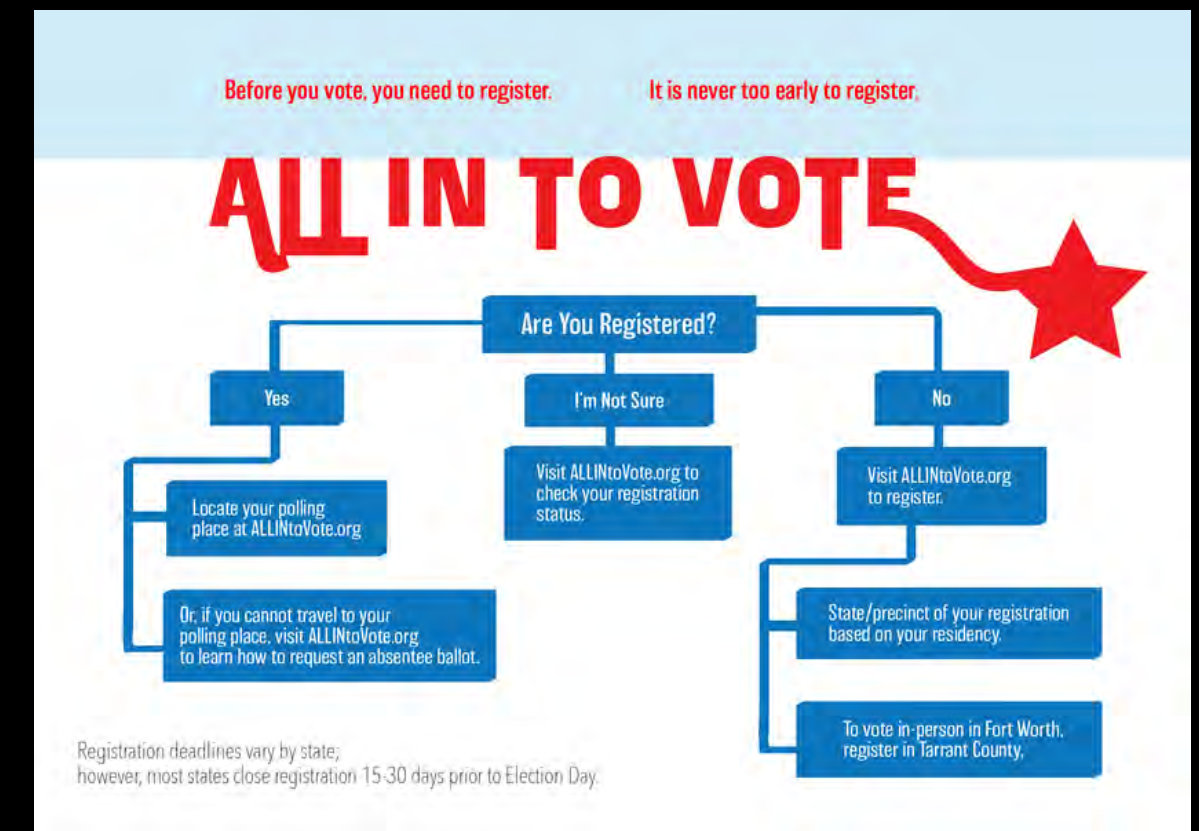

BLUU Outside Union Grounds/Library

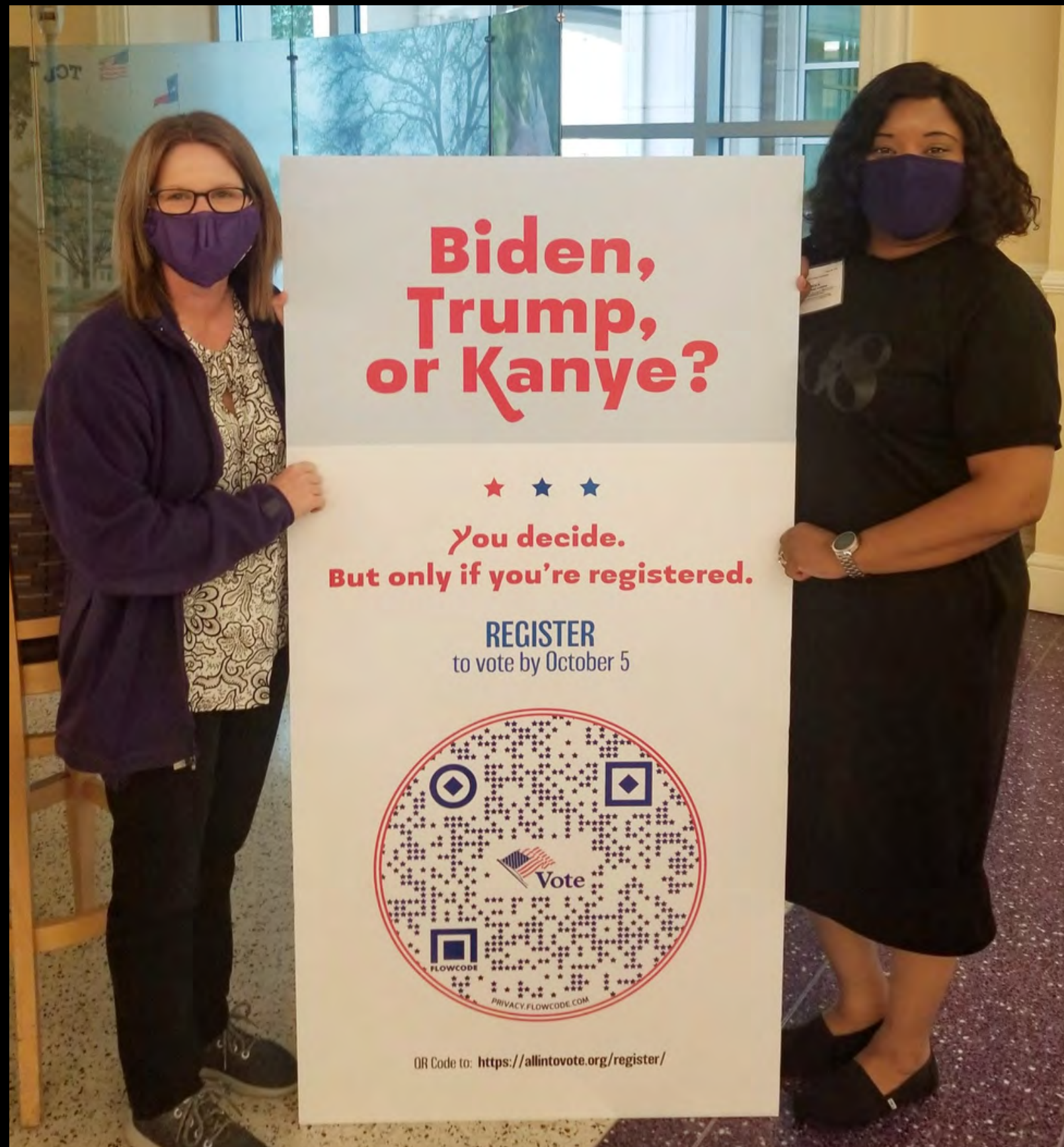

Vote in Fort Worth (Tarrant County) this November

- 1 REGISTER** to vote in Tarrant County by October 5 in order to be eligible for the November election.
 - Visit ALLINtoVote.org to register online, OR
 - Get an application at a September on-campus tabling event, OR
 - Contact Timeka Gordon at timeka.gordon@tcu.edu to complete an application on campus
 - Proof of Tarrant County residency may be required in the form of a driver's license, utility bill, etc.
- 2 LOCATE** your polling place
 - Vote at any polling place in Tarrant County during the early voting period, OR
 - Vote at your assigned precinct on Election Day
 - Locate your polling place at ALLINtoVote.org
- 3 TAKE** a photo ID with you to vote
- 4 VOTE!**

IMPACT

On Thursdays in September, the Office of Inclusiveness & Intercultural Services and the Office of Student Activities provided information on voter registration. In total, volunteers registered 22 students to vote and helped over a dozen request their absentee ballots, while many others were able to check their voter registration status.

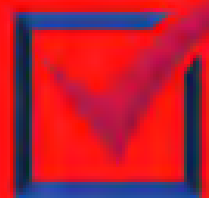

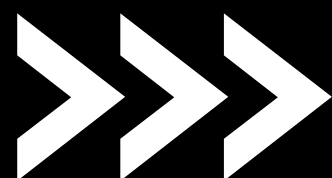

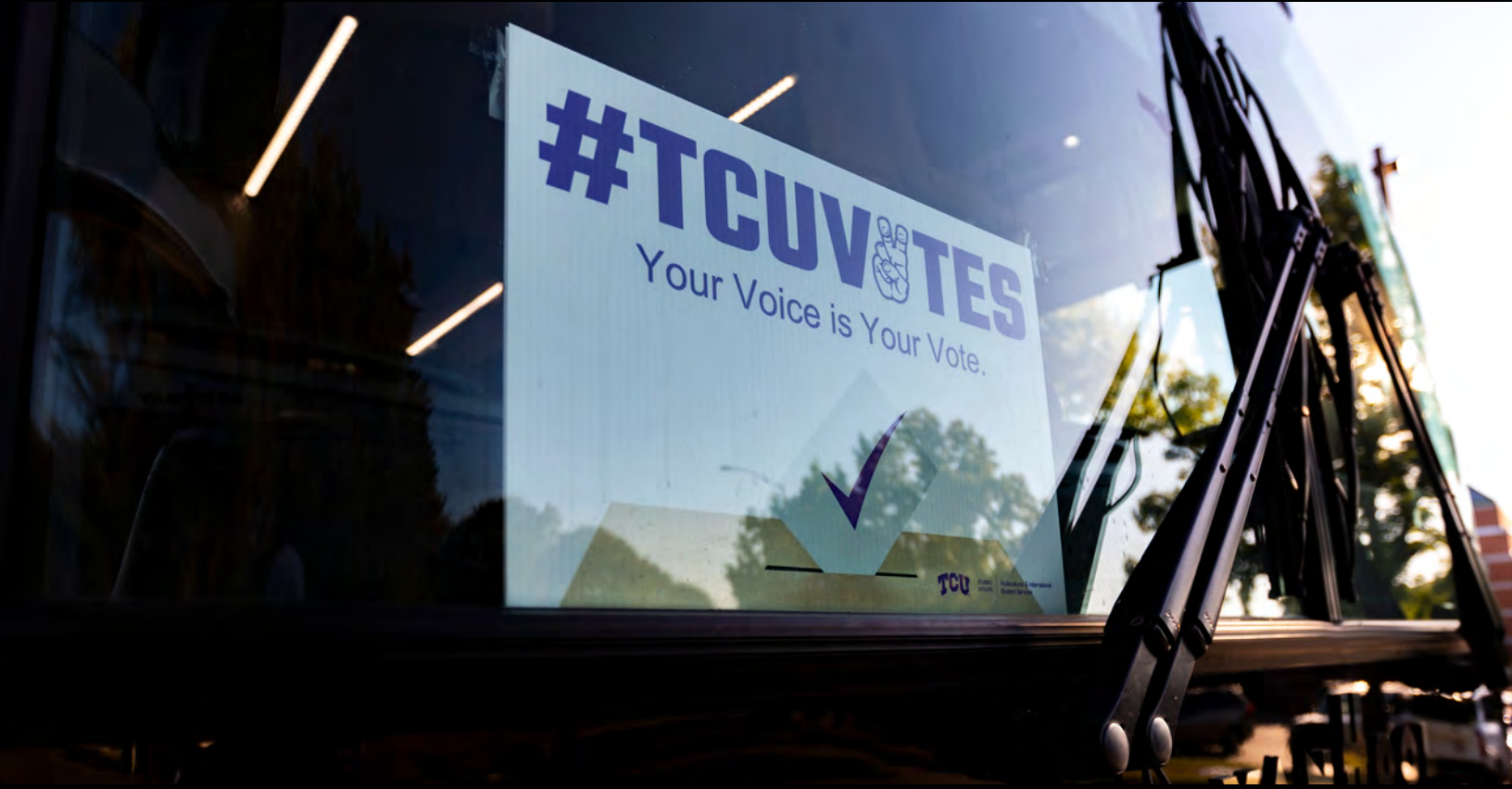

TCU Students Make Their Voices Count

From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 17, Multicultural and International Student Services provided transportation to an Early Voting site (Southwest Regional Library) for TCU students, staff and faculty who were registered to vote in Tarrant County. Breakfast and lunch were served for participants.

56 TCU Students, Faculty, and Staff participated in #TCUVOTES

40+ First-Time Voters participated in #TCUVOTES

50 TCU Students, Faculty, and Staff participated in #TCUVOTES (Tarrant County)

6 TCU Students, Faculty, and Staff participated in #TCUVOTES (Dallas County)

FIRST-TIME VOTERS' EXCITEMENT

"It can be confusing and intimidating to vote for the first time — I've been there," she added. "So it's important that we reduce this perceived difficulty and empower students to take action," said TCU Student Body President Paige Shiring.





VOTING PLACE EXPERIENCE

TCU students, faculty, and staff experienced a short wait to cast their ballot at the Southwest Regional Library in Fort Worth. Upon their arrival, participants were met by a photographer and videographer from Spectrum News DFW, Brian Scott. In addition, Heesoo Yang, a TCU360 Visual Editor and Senior at TCU, accompanied the group to the library. Yang was inspired by this event to cast his first ballot in Denton County a few days later. Both Brian and Scott asked participants how they were feeling on an early Saturday morning, preparing to cast their ballot in a critical election. Participants expressed excitement, mixed with how important and heavy this election was for them and their families. Many issues, including social justice and Covid-19, were top of mind for students.

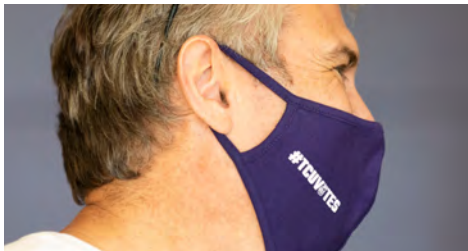


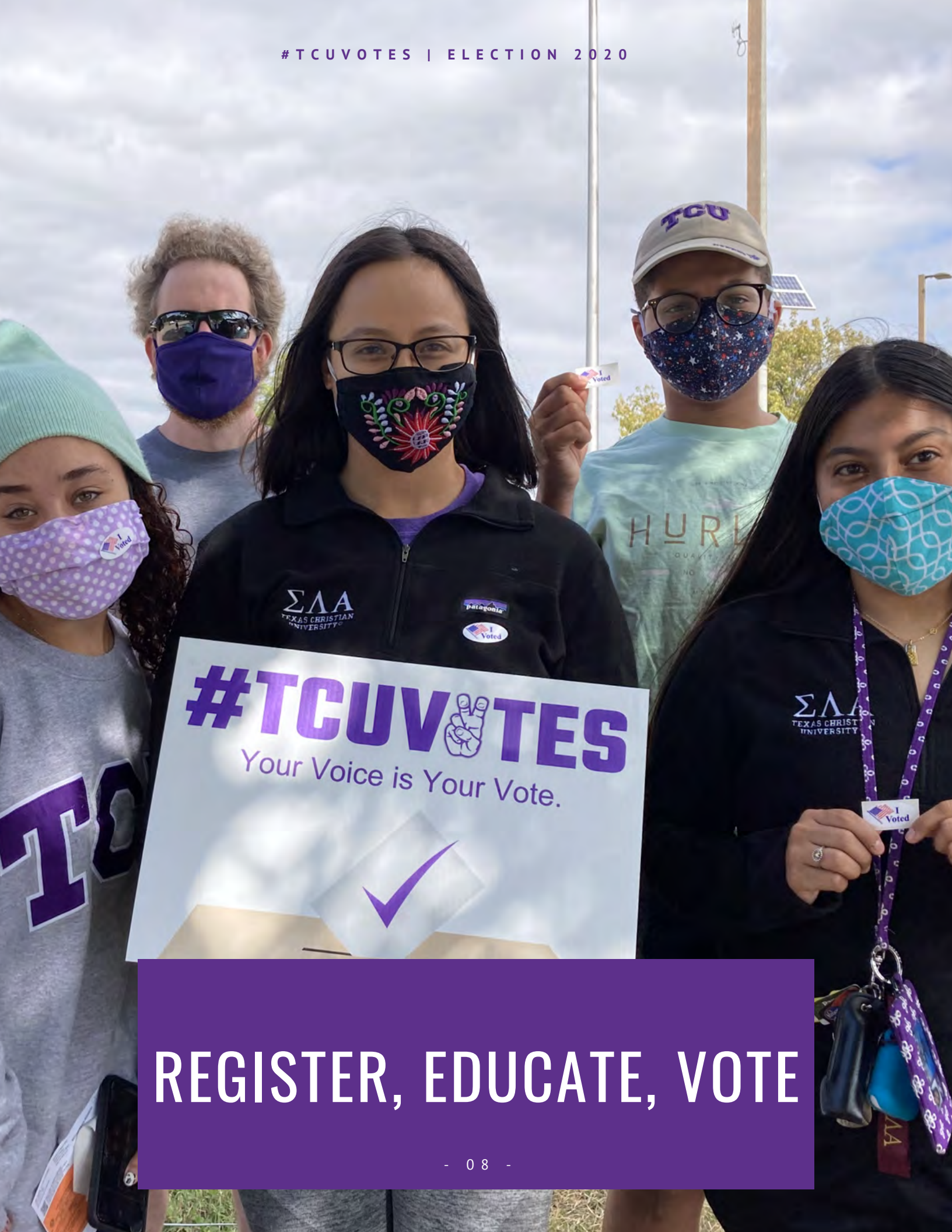
