

# **Executive Summary**

The University of Colorado Boulder (CU Boulder) has a long history of civic engagement. We are the largest university in the state and located in one of the most sought-after cities in the nation. Outgoing Chancellor Philip DiStefano, in 2022, prioritized strengthening the university's role as a critical piece of a healthy democracy, including providing a robust voter engagement and education campaign. In 2020, CU Boulder ran a comprehensive student voter education and participation program, housed the second most-used Voter Service Center in the state, and proudly won a platinum award from the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge for an 80.3% student voter participation rate. In 2022, CU Boulder was recognized as one of the Most Engaged Campuses for College Student Voting by the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge.

In 2024, we hope to meet or exceed the lofty standard set by again entering the <u>ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge</u> and working toward achieving the <u>Voter Friendly Campus Designation</u>. With a coalition of administrators, communicators, faculty, staff, students, and external voter engagement partners, we have enhanced our campus vote plan in order to reach more students than ever before as well as provide voter education and participation information for faculty and staff.

We believe the most effective way to engage students is peer-to-peer and face-to-face, so this is where most of our efforts will be centered. We will complement this work with a comprehensive communications campaign to ensure that students, faculty and staff are aware of all the opportunities to register to vote and cast a ballot.

#### Goals

- In the 2020 presidential election year, CU Boulder ran a comprehensive student voter
  education and participation program, housed the second most-used Voter Service Center in
  the state, and proudly won a platinum award from the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge
  for an 80.3% student voter participation rate, which was much higher than the (66%)
  average of our peer institution. In 2024, CU Boulder seeks to meet or exceed that student
  voter participation rate.
  - Our efforts will focus in particular on groups we have previously had less ability to reach. Specifically, first year students, graduate students, Colorado in-state students registered outside Boulder County, and minoritized students. All these groups have voted at lower rates than the campus average in the past two election cycles.
- In addition to a focus on registration and voting rates of students, in 2024 CU Boulder seeks to increase civic engagement of our students by increasing the number of election-related events and number of students participating in those events. CU Boulder aims to make more explicit the connection of these events to both the campus mission and to increase coordination and coherence across different types and topics of events.
  - This year CU has, or will, host several intentional election related events. Events include but are not limited to:
    - Sept. 16: Difficult Dialogue: "Election Year Polarization: Can we stay good neighbors?"
      - Explore how to stay connected with those we disagree with amid the polarized atmosphere of the November 2024 US presidential election.

  educate students directly about how to register to vote and the importance of civic
  engagement.
- Campus-wide communication strategy including voter participation and election information website, digital campaign.
- Tabling by campus and campus partners to provide in-person education and materials about registration and voting for students, faculty and staff.

# **Subcommittee on Operations**

Subcommittee Chair: Sawyer Bundgaard and Kirsten Schuchman, Office of Government and Community Engagement

This subcommittee will facilitate election operations in close coordination with the County Clerk and Recorders office. Given the university's unique quality of having two stand-alone mail ballot

drop-off boxes and one in-person polling center, this subcommittee is tasked to ensure that all rules and regulations are abided by. Responsibilities of this subcommittee include:

- Reporting violations of election laws or other polling location restrictions to proper authorities
- Providing the Clerk as well as the Clerk's agents and contractors with necessary access to premises
- Proving IT support
- Strategizing university response to inclement weather or other force majeure events
- Proving permitted maintenance and support.

#### **Subcommittee on Curricular/In-classroom Voter Education**

Subcommittee Chairs: David Meens, Office for Public and Community-Engaged Scholarship and Prof. and Assoc. Chair Janet Donavan, Dept. Of Political Science

This subcommittee brings together representatives of undergraduate and graduate student government, key student groups, the law school, the Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL), and our external partner organizations (New Era, Common Cause and the League of Women Voters). Its purpose is to enable the coordination of voter education and outreach activities through classroom and faculty engagement. Strategies include:

- Using a list provided by the registrar of around 7,750 course sections as the basis for outreach to instructors interested in classroom-based voter engagement
- In-class presentations to inform and motivate voter registration and participation, whether locally or by absentee ballot.
- A faculty resources webpage curated by the CTL
- Programming for faculty on how to effectively and responsibly incorporate and manage conversations related to voting and civic/political engagement in their classrooms
- Include a presentation on election-related information and issues as part of graduate student orientation and resource fair
- Coordinate a series of campus-facing events including:
  - Drop-in clinics with "experts" from the Law School, Political Science, and potentially other units, to answer questions about voting rules and logistics
  - Lectures, panels, debates or other well-publicized campus and public facing activities addressing civic and election-related issues

# **Subcommittee on Co-curricular Programming and Student Support**

The co-curricular subcommittee focuses on two primary objectives: providing voter education information effectively to students through programming and events and identifying and providing information about student support resources for students related to the election.

In this election cycle, we will continue to have a concerted approach to supporting
marginalized and underserved students, as well as ensuring voting awareness efforts for
all students, living both on and off-campus.

 Additionally, we will include representation from the Student Engagement Response Team (SERT), to ensure a holistic approach to protesting, and student awareness of campus policies.

As we move closer to election day, the student affairs subcommittee shifts the emphasis from voter education to student support resources, including any identified needs in student identity, health and wellness, residence life, off-campus, student organizations, sorority and fraternity life, etc.

# **CU Governance Group and External Partner Collaboration**

Staff, faculty and student governance groups, along with advisory campus leadership and key external partners such as the Boulder County Clerk and Recorder, Common Cause, New Era Colorado and others, will meet on a regular basis through the election season in order to:

- Facilitate information flow between internal and external partners, such as the Boulder County Clerk and Recorder and internal voting constituencies
- Assist internal and external groups to provide informational tabling and communication channels on campus
- Receive guidance and oversight from campus leadership advisors in areas of DEI, politics
- Ensure that work of all committees is aligned with the needs of all campus constituencies

# A Commitment to Civic Engagement

CU Boulder has a long history of civic engagement. We are the largest university in the state and located in one of the most sought-after cities in the nation. The <u>University Memorial Center</u>, our student union and heart of campus, has long served as a polling location. CU recently expanded its options by including a second ballot drop off location in the Williams Village neighborhood of campus.

CU has a long-standing history of protecting <u>free speech</u> and has set a tradition where students, staff, and faculty have organized protests and events on politics, civil rights, campus issues and more. The campus has also hosted speakers that have espoused a broad spectrum of positions and political views including Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Rudy Giuliani, Edward Snowden, Sonia Sotomayor, and Milo Yiannopoulos.

In 1993, CU Boulder joined the <u>Campus Compact</u> as a founding member of the regional Campus Compact of the Mountain West. The Campus Compact is a coalition of colleges and universities that are dedicated to advancing civic and community engagement. CU Boulder remains a part of the Campus Compact today.

The Office of Government and Community Engagement (OGCE) at CU Boulder supports the university's work to build and maintain relationships and partnerships with local government and community organizations along with the CU System Office of Government Relations. OGCE and all of its partners across campus, in the CU system, and in the community, work to align efforts with the university's strategic imperatives—shaping tomorrow's leaders, being the top university for innovation, and impacting humanity positively.

#### **CU Boulder Polling Locations**

Nationally, most university campuses do not have in-person voting options for students to use. The University of Colorado Boulder's commitment to voting accessibility is evident through its close partnership with the Boulder County Cleark and Recorders whereby two mail ballot dropoff boxes and two in-person polling station are situated on campus. Pursuant to the Colorado Election Code and Colorado Secretary of State's Election Rules these voting methods must meet certain requirements, including monitoring by an election official or video security surveillance recording system. The University and Clerk's agreement designates CU Boulder as the Property Representative.

The locations of the 24-hour mail ballot drop-off boxes include:

- 1) University Memorial Center
  - a. 1669 Euclid Avenue (closest to Euclid Avenue entrance)
- 2) Williams Village Center
  - a. 500 30th Street (bus stop / lane)

The locations of the polling center spaces include:

- 1) University Memorial Center ("UMC") Room 247 and UMC Room 235
  - a. 1669 Euclid Avenue
- 2) CU Campus Williams Village Multipurpose Rooms
  - a. 500 30th Street



#### **Protected Class Identities**

CU Boulder recognizes a total of 13 protected classes under our <u>Discrimination and Harassment policy</u>. It is important to identify two university recognized protected classes in relation to our commitment to civic engagement and expression of political beliefs on campus: political affiliation and political philosophy.

- Political affiliation refers to a person's membership or association with others in a commonality of political purpose and support.
- Political philosophy refers to a person's belief or endorsement of any system of thought pertaining to public policy or the administration of governmental functions.

At CU Boulder, the Office of Institutional Equity and Compliance (OIEC) serves to foster a safe, inclusive, and accessible environment that implements and enforces the university's Discrimination and Harassment policy.

# **Supporting Student Activism**

The <u>Division of Student Affairs</u> is a campus unit that encompasses many of the resources and services that support student success and allow them to partner their academic learning with developmental experiences outside of the classroom. The University and Student Affairs holds that <u>student activism</u> plays a key role in student's personal, academic, and leadership development during their time as students. Additionally, Student Affairs believes that student activism plays a key role in <u>CU's Flagship 2030</u> mission to provide a university environment that fosters global awareness and civic engagement.

Student Affairs has committed to providing support and guidance to students who wish to organize demonstrations or events, even if students are expressing opposition to the University's administrative decisions. Additionally, Student Affairs has committed to providing holistic support for students to facilitate and enhance the personal growth, success, health and well-being of every student. To help achieve these goals, Student Affairs created the Student Engagement Response Team and has formed intentional partnerships across the university and with community partners to be able to support students through any event that is disruptive to their lives, including the impacts of political expression, free speech, and even national/international conflicts.

The Student Engagement Response Team (SERT) is uniquely positioned to support students' awareness of campus policies, impacts to CU's academic mission and the Student Code of Conduct when students have an event (planned or impromptu) that may fall under descriptors such as demonstrations, protests, or rallies. This group has historically responded to support student organized events as well as events that are highly attended by or impactful to students that are organized by staff, faculty, or community partners.

## **Student Support & Resources**

We are also aware that students and the CU community can experience deep impacts as a result of an election, including the politicization of identities. Due to our diverse student population, it is extremely important that we support students holistically to ensure that they can be successful. # **Student Voting Demographics**

Using 2020 as a benchmark for this upcoming general election, of the 36,868 "Total Student Enrollment", 32,886 were eligible voters. Further, 29,797 students were registered and 26,420 students voted. This equated to a 91% voter registration rate (percent of your voting-eligible students who registered to vote) and an 80% voting rate (percentage of eligible students who vote).

#### **Voting Method**

Of those who voted, the method for voting changed year-by-year. Based on 2020 data 22,496 students voted "Not-In-Person", most likely by mail or ballot drop-off box, 2,021 voted "In-person" and 1,247 through "Early Vote".

#### **NSLVE**

The National Study of Learning, Voting, And Engagement (NSLVE) Data has served an important role in CU Boulder's goal setting and evaluation process. The CU Boulder NSLVE data on the 2020 voter participation rate has served a significant role in communicating to students that voting is an important, and common, process for Buffs. CU Boulder proudly highlights its voter registration and turnout rate compared to other CU and Big 12 institutions.

# Website

This year the University of Colorado Boulder has created an entirely new site for voting and civic engagement. The "Civic Engagement" election site, which can be found at

The website's homepage highlights major dates for the upcoming election and CU Boulder's 80.3% voting rate. Additionally, a tab on the website, titled "How to Vote", provides detailed steps for students to follow to register and vote in the election. Further, the website also offers a "Election Resources" tab that students can review before the election and a "Events" tab for all upcoming election related events.



# **Evaluation**

#### **NSLVE Data**

Work of the committee, through its four subcommittees and led by the steering committee, has begun and will continue through to election day on November 5, 2024. Data will be collected through the <a href="National Study of Learning, Voting and Engagement (NSLVE)">National Study of Learning, Voting and Engagement (NSLVE)</a> and provided to CU Boulder to measure our success in student voting participation. Staff and Faculty voting rates are not able to be captured reliably, and we will rely on anecdotal evidence of whether we are able to achieve increased participation and awareness of ballot content information.

# **Event Engagement**

Another method to evaluate campus engagement with the election is event attendance and participation. Campus events typically require Buff OneCard for admission and are often tracked on our student engagement portal, BuffConnect. Attendees of these events often receive a post event survey for feedback in regard to the engagement. By tracking the attendees, we can evaluate the number and demographics of attendees to help us better understand the communities on campus that are or are not being served/impacted by our initiatives
