

# University of Hartford 2024 Nonpartisan Democratic Engagement Action Plan

# **Executive Summary:**

This nonpartisan democratic engagement action plan was developed by University of Hartford in Connecticut for the 2024 election. The purpose of this action plan is to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter registration, education, and turnout in the 2024 election. The goals for University of Hartford for the 2024 election are:

- To support the campus community in learning about candidates and processes in the 2024 election.
- To encourage students to plan for voting
- To increase student voter registration rate in 2024, to equal or exceed that of 2020 (83.7%)
- To increase student voting rate of registered students in 2024, to equal or exceed that of 2020 (81.7%)
- To increase the voting rate of University of Hartford students in 2024, to equal or exceed that of 2020 (68.4%)
- To have our president sign the <u>ALL IN Higher Education Presidents' Commitment to Full</u> Student Voter Participation in October 2024
- To incorporate voter registration information into campus orientation for new students.

The University's <u>Values Statement</u> includes our commitment to a shared diverse community in which all members are celebrated:

At the University of Hartford we are committed to community. We are an academic community that values integrity, curiosity, creativity, excellence, responsibility, and accomplishment. Enriched by our diversity and our engagement with one another, we take pride in our shared traditions and experiences. Our commitment to nonpartisan democratic engagement is most often realized through programming that originates within the Division of Student Success, The Office of Student Engagement and Inclusion, The Office of Inclusive Excellence and Belonging, from the Governor M. Jodi Rell Center for Public Service, The Department of Politics, Economics, and International Studies, and The Student Government Association. Each of these entities supports programming around nonpartisan democratic engagement. A great deal of this programming involves bringing in speakers, workshop leaders, or sponsoring panels to inform the community about civic engagement issues.

In election seasons, programming also includes debate watching parties, voter drives, voter information programming (for example the Motivote app), and supporting transportation to polling sites on election day.

## Landscape:

# Voting in Connecticut

Connecticut is a relatively open state in terms of supporting free and fair elections with few barriers. In example, people in Connecticut have experienced Automatic Voter Registration since 2016 and the ability to vote early in elections as of 2024. Absentee ballots are also allowed in Connecticut under certain circumstances, and same-day registration is also allowed, up to and including election day.


Campus Demographic and Voting Data

University of Hartford is a private 4-year institution and joined the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge in 2020. The University of Hartford is an independent, nonsectarian, coeducational institution with approximately 3800 full time undergraduate students and 5900 students in total. We have students from 48 states and 51 countries. Forty percent of students are minorities, with 17% of students categorizing themselves as "black or African American," 18% "Hispanic of any race," and 4% "Asian"

University of Hartford has authorized the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE) and will receive campus voting data for the 2022 election in fall 2023. We renewed our NSLVE authorization in 2023.

Our 2024 NSLVE report indicates that while 83.7% of voting elibigle students registered in 2020, only 74.4% registered in 2022. In 2020, 81.7% of registered students voted and in 2022, 36.5% of registered students voted. **The net voting rate (the percentage of eligible students who voted) was 68.4% in 2020 and 27.1% in 2022.** That said, it is typical for fewer people to register to vote and to vote in non-Presidential election years. The national rate hovers around 66% of eligible voters voting in Presidential election years, with closer to 40% of eligible voters voting in midterm elections<sup>1</sup>. In this way, our student body did a little better than average in the last Presidential election and a little worse than average in the last midterm election when considering net voting rate.

## Strategy:

University of Hartford will implement these strategies to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and student voter participation.

- Goal: To support the campus community in learning about candidates and processes in the 2024 election.
  - Host speakers and presentations on topics such as engagement, activism, elections, and candidates.
  - Host bipartisan, welcoming, and engaging debate watching parties for both Presidential and Vice-Presidential nationally televised debates.
- Goal: To encourage students to plan for voting
  - Tabling for the Motivote app and encouraging students to use it to make a plan to vote
- Goal: Increase student voter registration rate in 2024 to equal or exceed that of 2020 (83.7%)
  - Tabling to support student voter registration
  - o Increase resources available to students in regards to voting and its processes
  - Promote pop up voter registration hub within The Office of Student Engagement and Inclusion
- Goal: Increase student voting rate of registered students in 2024, to equal or exceed that of 2020 (81.7%)
  - Informing the community through panels, debate parties, and Motivote tabling
  - Support students getting to the polls on election day
- Goal: To increase the voting rate of University of Hartford students in 2024, to equal or exceed that of 2020 (68.4%)
  - o Informing the community through panels, debate parties, and Motivote tabling
  - Support students getting to the polls on election day
- Goal: Have our president sign the <u>ALL IN Higher Education Presidents' Commitment to</u> <u>Full Student Voter Participation</u> by October 2024
  - Ask new President Ward to commit to supporting student enagement through the ALL IN Commitment
- Goal: incorporate voter registration information into campus orientation for new students.
  - Work with residential life and student success collaborative to incorporate voter registration information in campus orientation for new students in subsequent years.

## **Evaluation:**

We will evaluate our action plan in the following ways:

- University of Hartford will use the National, Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement to evaluate the increase of student voting by comparing our campus voter turnout and voter registration rates to past elections to measure progress on increasing both.
- The relevant campus partners will continue to support each other in programming for civic engagement, activism, democracy, civil discourse and the like, even in non-election years.
- We will partner with residential life and student success collaborative to ensure long term sustainable commitment to promoting civic engagement in student orientation in the future.
- Tracking Attendance at reoccuring events such as tabling initiatives, debate watch parties, and programs relating to voter infomation and elections.
