I. Executive Summary

This action plan was developed by Dr. H. Mark Ellis, Professor of Sociology and Criminal Justice; and Director, American Democracy Project to communicate our strategy for increasing both the registration and turnout rates of voters at William Paterson University. The planned activities outlined here will be carried out over Post Fall 2020 Presidential Elections through 2023, on and around our campus in Wayne, New Jersey.

The following groups will be leading this work at William Paterson University in order to accomplish our goals and further institutionalize our commitment to civic learning, democratic engagement, and youth participation in elections:

The mission of our initiative is:

The American Democracy Project (ADP) is a multi-campus initiative that seeks to create

Foundation. The goal of the project is to produce graduates who understand and are committed to engaging in meaningful actions as democratic citizens.

Since Spring 2021, William Paterson University's American Democracy Project (ADP) has been planning for the Fall 2022 Midterm Elections and what will follow leading up to the Fall 2024 Presidential Elections. Our campus team includes partnerships with Academic Affairs, Student Development, Campus Activities and Leadership, the College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences, the Cheng Library, and the Department of Political Science, Legal and Urban Studies.

The purpose of our work is to develop well-informed students who understand and participate in civic engagement while practicing their rights, roles and responsibilities as action-oriented citizens in our democracy with the intent of social betterment for all.

Our initiatives bring our campus community together around our shared work of civic engagement so that we will work collaboratively to offer a wide range of activities, lectures, and programs to excite our students about the power of their voices, their visions, and their votes. We aim for our students to realize their strength in shaping the world that they want to live in and the one that they want the next generation to inherit.

Due to on-going institutional restructuring over the past three years, the position for the Director of the American Democracy Project at William Paterson University is no longer offered as an on-load or over-load administrative assignment. This faculty individual now coordinates these activities as a part of service expectations for the University. Given growing class sizes and more faculty responsibilities, we have to recalibrate our programming and plan strategically. In addition, with the Office of Campus Activities and Leadership also down four full-time staff members who used to do much of this work, the University is currently discussing how best to move forward with our campus ADP and Civic Engagement work while keeping our momentum.

Please see below for what we are planning for Spring 2023. During the Spring 2023 semester, our committee will have a better idea of what our new division of Enrollment Management will look like and what it will include along with how this newly redesigned unit will work in tandem with Academic Affairs and Student Development to infuse and streamline our ADP and Civic Engagement programming into the University's co-curricular programs where students begin immediate participation in these activities from admissions and continue to participate in them until they graduate. At the end of our Institution's restructuring plan, which should be completed by the end of the Spring 2023 semester, we will have a better sense of our resources and will

plan accordingly as we approach the 2024 Presidential Elections. We will continue to educate our students on the importance of all elections including campus elections and the elections of local organizations and governments.

In Fall 2023, drawing from our campus expertise, we will present and co-sponsor a campus-wide series of events on issues ranging from climate change, to closing the achievement gap in higher education, to on-going criminal justice reform, to human rights, to access to healthcare, to the work of BLM, to immigration, to LGBTQIA+ rights, and to our on-going campus work on decolonization our Institution. This work fosters the creation of a campus culture that provides an atmosphere of belonging, diversity, equity, and inclusion. These and other pressing issues are always on the ballot and need to be constantly interrogated, interrupted, dismantled, and discussed as we educated our community to make informed decisions when voting.

- 5. Develop assessment measures to evaluate the efficacy of our on-going and future work.

VII. National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE)

Our campus has access to our National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE) data for 2019. In 2019 our registration rate was 76.6. In comparison to the data from four years prior in our NSLVE report, this rate increased.

In 2019, our voting rate was 40.3 and our voting rate among registered students was 52.6. During this year, our voting rate was higher than the national average.
